OTTAWA, March 30.—The swift passage of the Canada-United States Trade Agreement was interrupted by a debate on coal when the House of Commons today resumed examination of the treaty.

On the item which retains the duty of 50 cents a ton on importations of anthracite, A. J. Brooks (Con. Royal) opened up the whole question of the Government's policy relating to coal. He recalled the distress prevalent in the mining areas of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

Those areas were able to produce all of Canada's coal needs, but the problem of geography intervened and militated against selling Maritime coal in central Canada. As a measure of protection a more substantial duty should be imposed against importations of coal.

Canada's coal imports in 1937 totalled 18,023,000 tons and in 1938 totalled 14,213,000 tons. The Dominion's production in those years was 15,835,000 and 14,233,000 tons respectively. The country thus imported approximately 30 per cent of its needs. Mr. Brooks urged that the duty be increased.

Ont. Seek Repeal Of Temperance Act

TORONTO, March 29.—In the first straight party division of the present session of the Ontario Legislature, the House today by 48 to 19 adopted a resolution asking the Parliament of Canada to repeal the Temperance Act, which applies to the Province of Ontario.

LE GILSATURE IN SESSION YESTERDAY

Legislative Assembly, March 30.

The House met at 12:20 p.m. Hon. Mr. McAllyre introduced an Act to amend the Insurance Act, also an Act to amend the Road Act, 1936 which were given first reading.

Hon. Mr. McLaughlin tabled the estimates of revenue and expenditure for the current year. Mr. Hughes asked the Minister of Public Works when the annual report of his department would be tabled.

Hon. Mr. McAllyre said not until next week. Mr. Hughes: "The difficulty is we won't have them to study over the recess."

The Clerk read a communication from the secretary of the Lieutenant Governor enclosing a letter from the Department of the Secretary of State, Ottawa, approving the provincial statutes passed in 1937.

On motion of Mr. Acorn the House went into committee with Mr. Hughes in the chair on an Act to amend the Souris Incorporation Act.

The bill authorizes the borrowing, in addition to the sum of \$6,000 already authorized, an additional sum of \$4,000 for permanent debt of the Town which the total estimated cost to the Town will be \$10,000.

Mr. Acorn, in reply to questions by Hon. Mr. Allen, said the debt of \$30,000, of which \$18,000 matures in 1942. Against this debt there are sinking funds amounting to about \$13,000 invested in Dominion and P. E. I. Government bonds.

The Town has its own electric light plant, operating at a profit. The bill was reported agreed to without amendment.

After Recess

The House resumed at 3:20 p.m. The following bills were read a third time and passed: An Act respecting Arrest and Bail; an Act to amend the Montague Incorporation Act; an Act to vest certain lands in the Roman Catholic Episcopate of Charlottetown; an Act to amend an Act to enable the Government of Prince Edward Island to receive temporary loans; an Act to amend the Land Assessment Act, 1924; an Act to amend the Dairyman's Association Act.

Farm Rehabilitation

Hon. Mr. Dennis moved, seconded by Hon. John A. Campbell, the following resolution: "Whereas the recent world-wide economic depression and unsatisfactory state of home and foreign markets was seriously reflected in the depression of agricultural prosperity in this Province, particularly during the years from 1931 to 1936;

"And Whereas a large number of industrious and progressive farmers have, by maintaining the standard and quality of their product, and the condition of their equipment and the fertility of their soil, survived the adverse effects of the depression and have been able to take advantage of improved market conditions;

"But Whereas an alarmingly large number of farmers have on account of the depression or other causes been unable to prevent the depletion of their livestock and equipment, the disrepair of their buildings and premises, and the deterioration of the fertility of their soil, and are therefore unable to produce crops or other agricultural products of reasonable quantity or standards;

"And Whereas for the reasons aforesaid very numerous farms throughout the Province are now unoccupied or uncultivated and still more numerous farms are far below the reasonable standard of productivity;

"And Whereas a large number of persons who are not now profitably employed, particularly sons of farmers and other suitable young men, might be well and profitably employed in the cultivation and improvement of such vacant and substandard farms;

"And Whereas the present Youth Training Courses in the subjects of Agriculture, Poultry, Forestry, Carpentry, Mechanics, and Leadership are specially designed to better fit the young men for such employment;

"And Whereas during the past three years the Department of Agriculture has pursued a policy of assisting farmers by the distribution of seed grain, poultry, hogs, live stock, and lime;

"But Whereas such assistance cannot be made sufficiently extensive to provide for the rehabilitation of distressed farmers and substandard farms except by the adoption of a systematic scheme of public assistance or credit and adequate supervision;

"Therefore Resolved that the Government should formulate a systematic and comprehensive plan for the rehabilitation of distressed farmers and substandard farms, by the furnishing of livestock, or fertilizer, or credit or otherwise, with adequate supervision to secure the protection and improvement of any public investment so involved;

"Further Resolved that such a scheme should be properly directed towards the placement or assistance of unemployed farmers' sons or other suitable young men fitted for agricultural employment;

"Further Resolved that, for the purpose of instituting such a program, an immediate survey should be carried out of all the unoccupied and substandard farms in the Province, including an inventory of their machinery, live-stock, buildings and equipment, and the condition of each, as well as an outline of the nature and quality

BOSTON, March 30.—(CP)—The mass escort service for the socially needy seems to have fulfilled a want in this conservative city. Early trepidations there may have been, but the service has been established by one agency that is thriving so far, under distant supervision. Similar services have been doing land-office business in New York, Chicago and other cities.

Boston as a starter has on call 50 hand-picked college graduates or undergraduates. Established to provide the extra man for parties or to appease the wants of the fun-loving unattached, each escort has to pass a rigid examination as to social background, education and responsibility. They must provide five references before they are even asked to meet a height minimum of five feet, nine inches and requisites pertaining to dress, physical appearance and conversational ability.

Because of the nature of the work no escort is allowed to drive a car. Clients can have whatever type of companion most suited to them—sportsman, night-clubber, scientist, book-worm, or just an all-round man.

No escort can enter a woman's apartment unless there are at least three in the group. Heavy drinking is absolutely off. Courtesy and service mandatory.

Canada Hold High Position British Trade

Canada's share of the British import market has increased from 3.80 per cent in 1929 to 8.53 per cent in 1938, according to the position of second most important supplier of merchandise to the United Kingdom and leading all other Empire countries. The United Kingdom's share of the British import market has increased from 47.8 per cent in 1929 to 49.39 per cent, the highest figure yet recorded. The expansion in the share of domestic exports absorbed by British countries, which received a setback in 1937, was resumed again in 1938 when the figure rose to 49.87 per cent, also the highest on record."
