PAIRINGS FOR DAVIS CUP PLAY DRAW

United States to Meet China in First Round of Play.

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Feb. 1.—With diplomatic representatives from the competing nations looking on, Samuel Hoare, President of the British Lawn Tennis Association, today drew from the gleaming silver Davis Cup the pairings for the 1935 international tennis team competition which sends the United States against China in its first match. It is the first time China has entered for the cup since it was defeated five matches to none in 1928 by the United States in a second round encounter. Mexico and Cuba, the other two nations entering the North American Zone competition, were paired with the winner to play the United States in the zone final. The dates and sites will be set later.

Canada, a regular entrant until this year, withdrew because of the necessity of early summer play which did not allow its team time to get in condition. Several nations in all challenges for the historic trophy, won from France by England in 1933 and successfully defended against the United States by Fred Perry and Henry W. (Bunny) Austin last summer at Wimbledon. Brazil and Uruguay challenged in the South American Zone and Poland, South Africa, France, Germany, Italy, Czechoslovakia, Yugoslavia, Japan, Holland, New Zealand and Australia in Europe. The European group includes the four semi-finalists of the 1934 zone play—Australia, Italy, Czechoslovakia and France—and the survivors of the fall eliminations.

Complete Arrangements For Bout
