THE Lake Winnipeg sailed last night for Liverpool.

MESSEURS MURDOCK McRAE, John M. McDonald, Hector J. McKenzie, and W. M. McKenzie, of Flat River, leave this morning for Leadville, Colorado where they expect to enter the mining business. The GUARDIAN wishes them success.

AN OTTAWA despatch says:—The Government have allotted some of the \$10,000, being a balance of subsidy to the Canadian Steamship Company, for a steamship to call at Ch'town, on or about the 15th December, and deliver a cargo from Great Britain, taking in a cargo for London and Liverpool, which will be delivered via Milford Haven.

AN agitation is abroad among the merchants for abolishing the tolls in connection with the market building. A deputation of Charlottetown's leading merchant's waited upon the City Council at an informal meeting held last night. Councillors Taylor, Horne and Nicholson were absent. Mr. F. Perkins acted as spokesman for the delegation and expressed their reasons why the tolls should be abolished. The matter will be considered at the regular council meeting on Monday evening.

WHEN Charlottetown ladies enter upon a project their efforts are almost invariably crowned with success. This is re-eminently true of the Hospital tea held yesterday evening in the Y. M. C. A. hall. There was a crush of people during most of the evening. The Protestant churches of the city all had tables laden with choice eatables. Some of the tables were filled six times in succession by friends of the P. E. I. Hospital. The candy tables and the cake table were patronized exceptionally well. The exact proceeds are not known but it is believed that about \$200 was realised. This money will remain in the hands of the Ladies' Aid, who it is understood will devote it to some special feature of the new hospital.

A MEETING of the quarterly official board of the Methodist church at Fredericton was held Tuesday evening. Rev. J. J. Teasdale presiding. Several matters in connection with the church were talked over, but the principal business before the board was the selection of a successor to Rev. Mr. Teasdale, whose pastorate ends next June. It was unanimously decided to extend a call to Rev. G. M. Campbell, of Charlottetown, now pastor of the church which Rev. Mr. Teasdale is to take.—St. John Telegraph.

REV. MATTHEW SMITH of Annapolis, N. B., is in the city after having paid a short visit to friends in the eastern part of the province. Although in his 86th year Mr. Smith is hale and hearty. He preached three times last Sunday, at Pownal, at Alexander and at Hazel Grove. On one of these occasions he preached in the same place as he did over 60 years ago, when a youth attending school in Charlottetown. Service at that time was held in the house of a Mr. Burhoe and Mr. Smith remembers all the surroundings as if it were but yesterday.

SOUTH EASTERN ITEMS.—Rev. Mr. McKay, of Nova Scotia, has been holding a series of evangelistic meetings in the Presbyterian church, Montague Bridge, for the past two weeks. Mr. McKay is one of the most devoted champions of the Christian cause who have visited this part of the province. He was ably assisted in his efforts by Rev. Mr. Spence of the above named church, and by Rev. Mr. Penna, Methodist pastor of Montague. The audience which was very large every night showed its appreciation of Mr. McKay's preaching by the very apt attention paid throughout.
