Princess' Crown Lies Unclaimed

SYDNEY, Australia, Oct. 19—(CP)—A beautiful 600-year-old diamond crown, once the property of Princess Anna of the Austrian Hapsburg dynasty—lies unclaimed in a bonded store-room at the customs office here.

The crown was assigned to a Hungarian refugee by Emre Tieberger, Hungarian Crown Jeweller, for disposal in Australia, but Hungary entered the war before it was cleared.

Customs officials impounded it as enemy property and the consignee, former Budapest gem expert Andrew Balogh, instructed the bank to return the crown to the financial house of Tieberger as soon as it was released.

The customs office told Balogh he could collect it if he cared to pay outstanding charges, but the bank refused to allow him to do so.

The bank claims it can't release it to me because of my instruction to them to send it back to Tieberger. He told a reporter, "As Tieberger was killed in Hungary in 1944, I don't know what the bank can do about it."

The bank claims it is only interested in returning the jewel to the financial house in Hungary. If, as suspected, the financial house was destroyed during the war, the crown probably will be disposed of by the controller of enemy property.
