

A STORY OF SPAIN

"Blood and Sand" Gives Rodolph Valentino Big Role

B. C. Salmon Output Is 1,000,000 Cases

OTTAWA, Oct. 16.—Canadian Government fishery officials have received sufficient reports from various salmon canneries of British Columbia to indicate that the total pack of all classes of salmon will amount to 1,000,000 cases. Many canneries are still packing chum and cohoes, believing that the demand this winter will be able to care for the entire pack. Sockeye fishing season is over and 6½ inch mesh nets are again in use, which catch only the larger fish. A total of 275,000 cases of sockeyes were packed this year, against only 163,000 cases in 1921. Owing to the fact that Siberian red fish reached London before the British Columbia sockeye could be shipped, and the Siberian fish is selling for considerably less than the salmon from that province, there have been only a few small shipments of sockeyes moved from Vancouver this season. Canneries are holding in hopes that the British market will meet the price and take of Siberian fish. With the preference Canadian canned salmon instead of ential tariff existing between Canada and France, Canadian pinks are selling in that country to good advantage. The fish from Vancouver can be landed in France for about 60 cents less than United States pinks.

FIRE LOSSES IN CANADA.

Fire losses in Canada during the week ended October 11 are estimated by the Monetary Times at \$433,450, compared with \$843,500 the previous week. This does not include the northern Ontario fire, the damage from which has been estimated close to \$8,000,000.

Fire losses in Canada in September are estimated by The Monetary Times at \$3,127,000, compared with \$1,928,355 in August and with \$2,410,000 in September last year. The total for the first nine months of 1922 is \$28,808,105, or nearly as much as last year's total loss of \$30,932,110.
