## LETTER FROM FRONT

The following letter has been received by Miss Bertha McLean, Lake Verde, formerly of Gaytown, from her Brother Russel:

July 21, 1916.  
Dear Sister:—I received your letter a week ago. I was in the front line and it is my only excuse for not writing before, not that I couldn't write but I couldn't get any paper. Well Bertha I enlisted in St. John New Brunswick in the 55th Battalion, on May 7, 1915. We left St. John on the 9th and went to Sussex, N. B., from there we moved to Valcartier on the 15th of July and left Valcartier for England on the last day of October so I think I have given you the whole history of my soldiering in Canada. We arrived in England on the 9th of November at Bramshott Camp, Hants. We stayed there for three months and left the later part of January and went to Westenhanger quite near Sandling. It is in the Shorncliffe Military district. Left Westenhanger for Dygate near Shorncliffe and from there for France.
