MONTREAL, Feb. 2 — (CP) — The Montreal Tramways Commission by a majority vote today decided to increase fares to three tickets for 25 cents, instead of four, and to set a 15-cent cash fare after 1 a.m., upon the expiration of the delays fixed by laws. The decision will not go into effect for at least two months be-

cause under a bill now before the Quebec Legislature a delay of 60 days is given any interested party to appeal.

WINNIPEG, Man. — (Special) — This afternoon, though the wind was cold, and it had dropped to 10 degrees below zero, I called on the MacDonald family at 64 Maryland St. I had heard a great deal about the family, but previous to my visit, had not made their acquaintance.

Mrs. MacDonald, a gracious lady of pleasing personality, answered the door, when I called, and when I said, "My name is—, I am from P.E.I.," I received the answer, "Welcome to the home." "Dad," she called, "Here is a man from the island." He came from the room and bade me welcome, and the reception was so warm and genuine, that at once I felt I was not among strangers—but friends with something in common—P.E.I. The conversation was immediately asked P.E.I. Many questions were asked and much information was exchanged. One question I took particular note of—"Do you know Willie MacMillan—Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, leader of His Majesty's Loyal Opposition?" "Aye," thought I, "these people are Conservatives."

I met in the home, a daughter-in-law, from Peniticon, B. C., who is holidaying with the MacDonald family. Mrs. MacDonald and her daughter-in-law, having an afternoon date, departed shortly after I arrived, leaving me with Mr. MacDonald, with whom I spent a most interesting visit. Mrs. MacDonald, in bidding good-bye said, "Do come again. We have just got started to talk. There is so much yet to talk about P.E.I."

Mr. MacDonald, I found to be a storehouse of information. He is a man of vast experiences. He related to me his Island life, his experience in the West as a farmer, Inspector, Mr. MacDonald was Inspector of Civilian Airfields, all over the West, during the war. He has been on semi retirement since 1946. In B. C., Mr. MacDonald, whilst acting as Inspector, employed by an American firm saw a great deal of, and had an active part in, the energetic and enormous work done in preparation, lest the Japs attack, when they were in possession of the Aleutian Islands.

Mr. and Mrs. MacDonald came West in 1916, and had eleven children, all but one, the youngest, were born on P. E. I.

Mr. MacDonald is the son of the late Daniel H. and Margaret C. (Thornton) MacDonald and was born at Bedouque, P. E. Island. His wife, Margaret Ann, is the daughter of the late John MacDonald, Clermont, P. E. Island. Their family consist of seven sons, and four daughters: Daniel J., Sergeant in War 1914-18, now Superintendent of Marion Steel Shovel Works, Marion, Ohio; John E., Sergeant in war 1939-45, now construction mechanic with a construction company in Peniticon, B. C.; Rev. Leo, A. Roman Catholic Chaplain overseas in war 1939-45, now chaplain at Deer Lodge (Veterans' Hospital), Winnipeg; Ronald J., firefighter in England in war 1939-45, now engineer in Timmins, Ontario; Bernard, Superintendent of Campbell Construction Co., in Vancouver, B. C.; Joseph A., engineer with the Copper Cliff, Nickel Mine, Eastern Canada; Edward, dead; Marion, principal of Elmwood Public School, Winnipeg; Josephine, nurse, Mrs. O. E. Coza, M. P., Valleyfield, Que.; Gladys, Sister M. St. Geraldine, Sisters of Missions, St. Edward Convent, Winnipeg; Margaret, Nurse, Mrs. Henry Devion, St. Boniface, Man.

Mrs. MacDonald has two brothers, James E., living in Bedouque, P.E.I. on the old homestead; and Lt. Col. R. H. MacDonald, M.D., F.A.C.S., F.R. C. (C.), living in Saskatoon, Sask; and three sisters, Nellie living in Bedouque, P. E. Island; Annie, Sister Claire, Superior of the Convent of Mercy, Manchester, N. Hampshire, U. S.; Beatrice, nurse in the war 1914-18, who was awarded the P.S.C. M.M., R.R.C. Croix de Guerre, living in New York, U.S. Beatrice had a very interesting career and played a prominent part as a nurse with the U. S. Army Reserve Nurses Corps in the first World War. As a member of the American Hospital Unit, she worked in conjunction with British Hospital Units, and was at the front in the Battle of Passendale. For her services, she was decorated by three nations, United States, Great Britain and France.

Mrs. MacDonald has three sisters, Mrs. Philip Peters, Mrs. Wm. MacDonald and Mrs. Edward MacAulay, all of Boston, U.S., and four brothers, Daniel living in Utah, U.

RE-VACCINATION will be carried out in the Charlottetown Schools and in Spring Park and Parkdale for Grades VII to X and for pupils in lower grades who were vaccinated during infancy.

Re-vaccination is now recommended to be done every six years. Small pox still exists in other parts of Canada and in the U. S. A. and in this day of rapid travel from one part of the continent to another it could easily spread to our Province.

Forms for parents' written consent for re-vaccination will be distributed in the schools to Grade VII to X pupils. Parents are requested to sign these and return them to the teacher promptly. Pupils in Grades I to VI will be done on parent's request.
