IN THIS CORNER

It appears more evident every day that when Jim Evans enters the ring to defend his title against George Leslie at Kensington Wednesday night, he will be an overwhelming favorite to turn back the challenge of the ex-champion. The entire western end of the Island from whence Evans hails can see nothing but an Evans victory which is to be expected; but in addition the champ has a large following locally that are certain he will again prove too smart for the Scots boy.

There is little doubt but that Leslie was overmatched and out-generaled the night he lost his title. Evans was a real general that night and could see the way to win. He has the championship knowing the way to win and he is not a man who will be content to come, Evans' sense of the game was shown in his victory over Leslie in a decisive manner.

But whether or not he can repeat his feat is another matter. Leslie is a different Leslie this time—a Leslie who realizes that he has the second best of his career counting up and not a Leslie who is taking the scrap as just another battle. As was the case the last time the two met, it is highly probable Leslie is determined to win and nothing is surer but that he will give every ounce of energy and courage he possesses, if by so doing he obtains his title.

There is not a more serious man than Leslie on the Island today. The training bears this out. Every day he goes through a rigorous preparation for the bout, road work, shadow boxing, calisthenics and rough, bristling boxing sessions with as many as five hours already has him at razor edge. Usually so-called experts, Leslie is down so far now that his handlers have a tough time with him as he waits impatiently for the night of the fight; and that is a sure sign that the challenger is in the finest condition of his career and that in this respect at least the challenger will be on better than even terms with the champion.

Semi-final bouts usually attract little attention on a fight card. This may be the case when Binnis and Hoyle, tangle in their semi-rounds preceding the main event Wednesday night but to Bennie Binnis the fight is going to be very important and likely will mark the turning point in his career.

It is a funny thing about Bennie. A year ago this boy was considered the outstanding Island boxer and a popular performer at that. But 12 months can make a lot of changes and such has been the case with Binnis.

Indifferent to training, indifferent showings in various bouts have sent him tumbling down the ladder just when it appeared as if he would go places. His last appearance was a far cry from the night the slim 135 pound youngster came within a few seconds of hanging a knockout on Leslie, a man who outweighed him by forty pounds.

He showed at his best that night, although eventually defeated, but never since has he showed the same fire and determination. Whether or not the defeat disheartened him is a matter of conjecture; it doesn't matter anyway. It is all behind him now and Binnis is looking for a fresh start.

The Hoyle bout is the first in a comeback attempt, and it rests entirely with Bennie himself whether or not it will be successful. He faces a tough, rugged opponent in the person of the Nova Scotian battler, a boxer noted for his kameness who will provide a stiff test for the punching and stamina of the CharloTTetown boy.

But Binnis mentioning a comeback is a mighty serious. With one of the fundamentals of boxing on his side, namely youth, there should be no reason why he shouldn't retain his lost prestige. For the first time in a long while he is training hard and diligently for a fight. Manager Bill Ryan is more than pleased with the change noted in his charge. "He's revived" down again," said Bill yesterday, "and is rapidly rounding into shape. Not the best shape he has ever been in, but good enough for me to guarantee that fans at Kensington will catch a glimpse of last year's Binnis in action Wednesday night."

Industrial League games are improving rapidly these days and fans are witnessing some real bang-up games with the players showing far more hustle and pep than was their wont in the opening season. The officials in charge won't stand for any lagging whatever and the players sensing this are really getting into the game and as a result the crowds are on the increase.

There has been some game pitching witnessed in local ball circles during latter years and probably since the game had its inception here but in the weekend fixture of the Industrial League between the Cubs and Anchors, Ernie Robins, Cubs hurler gave an exhibition of

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New York Giants Retain Slim Hold On League Lead; Dean Wins Ninth Victory

NEW YORK, June 13—New York Giants retained their slim hold on first place in the National League today by splitting a doubleheader here with Cincinnati Reds winning the nightcap 6-2 after dropping the opener 5-1.

Although the winning pitching featured each game, with Peaches Davis hurling a four-hitter in the opener and Clyde Castleman allowing eight hits in the nightcap, the extra-base clouting of the Reds gave the Giants anxious moments at both tilts.

Alex Kampouris hit a homer in each game, his 11th and 12th of the season. Lew Riggs put the opening game on ice early with two homers in the first four innings. In the nightcap Chick Hafey hit a round-tripper in the eighth.

In Brooklyn, Van Mungo came back and fat Freddy Fitzsimmons made a successful debut in a Brooklyn uniform as the Dodgers knocked Pittsburgh Pirates down in their fourth place by winning both ends of a doubleheader.

Mungo, making his first start since he was summoned to the bedside of his critically ill son in South Carolina nearly two weeks ago, fanned five and allowed seven hits to win the opener 6-2. Fritz, traded to Brooklyn by the Giants on Friday, pitched a five-hitter for a 4-1 win the nightcap.

Chicago Cubs held the league lead for a short time after defeating the Phillies in the first game of a twin bill 16-8 but quickly dropped out of the top spot when Philadelphia won the second 4-3 before 10,000 Philadelphia fans.

A 22-hit barrage, which included three home runs and five two-baggers, gave the visitors an easy conquest in the first tilt.

Chuck Klein's third home run of the season with two men on base in the eighth inning and Philadelphia behind 3-1, defeated the Cubs in the second contest.

The Giants barely survived a late rush by Cincinnati Reds Saturday to close out a 4-3 victory and retain their 1-2 game lead on first place.

Giants won by the margin of an unearned run in the fifth inning after Mel Ott had set them off in front with a homer with two men on board in the opening inning.

Chicago Cubs kept on the heels of the Giants by pounding out a 10-5 victory over the Phillies. Home runs by Joe Merty, Augie Galan and Ripper Collins featured the Chicago attack.

In the other scheduled matches, Pittsburgh defeated Brooklyn 8-3 and St. Louis outscored Boston 4-1.
