OXFORD CRACKS 13-YEAR OLD ROWING JINX

Slow Time Recorded As Dark Blues Triumph In Closing Stage Of Race

PUTNEY-ON-THAMES, March 24—The defeatist jinx broken by their first victory in 14 years, Oxford rowing men tonight looked forward to evening the all-time score of the 109 years of the intervarsity classic and re-establishing the fame of the dark blues, so long overshadowed by brilliant crews from Cambridge.

Today's Oxford victory brought the count to: Cambridge 47 wins; Oxford 41. One race was a dead heat; in 1912 both boats sunk; in the years immediately following establishment of the event in 1829 it was not strictly an annual tilt and several years went without a race at all.

Lord, Stanley, Goal, age 21, weight 150, has been a standout during this season, especially during the play off games.

MacLeod, George, (Rory), defence age 26, weight 160 lbs. a polite checking expert and steady player. Not as fast as his brothers but a tricky stick handler.

Miller, Ralph, (Gings), defence, age 22, weight 170 lbs. speedy and a wonderful poke checker.

Thomas, Keith, defence, age 25, weight 170 lbs. Keith is a marvellous utility player, being available for either defence or the forward line. A fast skater and rugged.

MacLeod, Lewis, right wing, age 21, weight 140 lbs. Unfortunately we are obliged to use Lou on right wing instead of on the defence which is his natural position. A natural checker, pure dynamite.

Knox, John, centre or left wing, age 20, weight 170 lbs. Jack has developed this season into one of the stars of the team, always in his position and in the right place at the right time. Fast, a good stick handler and accurate shot.

MacLeod, Donald, left wing, age 25, weight 165 lbs. the veteran of the team, playing during the previous years for the Maritime crown. Donald was obliged to don the blades when Bill McLean was lost to the province. A fast skater with a wicked shot. Don is just rounding into shape and has been a tower of strength during the play offs. He is manager of the team.

MacLeod, Lester, right wing, age 22, weight 160 lbs. Lester has played a lot of hockey, being on the team in 1930 at the age of 15 when we went to the finals. Probably the fastest skater on the team, a tricky stick handler and has a wicked persistent back checker and can take a pass or lay one down with the best of them.

MacLeod, Dan, captain, centre, age 23, weight 160, a natural born playmaking centre, fast, and a stick handler "a la Joliat". Dan's passing and receiving is a revelation to watch. Opposing defence-men and goalies have to move lively when Dan is about.

Farrar, Warren, left wing, age 22, weight 170, husky, a fast tireless skater and good playmaker. Is really more at home on the defence can check with the best of them. A good stick handler and carries a wicked shot.

McLean, William, right wing, age 20, weight 160 lbs. Bill was lost to the team during the play offs and sadly missed. He was transferred to the bank in Sheet Harbor, N. S. Bill is a very fast skater, a good stick handler and has a wicked shot. He is at home in any company and can look out for himself.

Dave Trotter May Be Lost To Maroons

MONTREAL, March 24—Montreal Maroons, with a slogan of "two straight," left tonight for Boston and the second of their second-place Stanley Cup playoff with Boston Bruins.

Manager Tommy Gorman made a one-sentence speech before the team pulled out: "We'll give them a battle." He said the same thing Tuesday night before Maroons whipped the Bruins 4-1 in the first game.

Though Dave Trotter was taken away, Gorman was undecided tonight whether the left winger would play. Trotter, suffering from a badly-cut eye, was ready to go if Gorman gave the word.

If Trotter is unable to play, it was expected Gorman would send out Carl Voss to centre the second line and Paul Runge the third, instead of alternating the two on one line. Otherwise no lineup changes were contemplated.

BRUINS READY
BOSTON, March 24—Eager to stretch their second-place Stanley Cup playoff to three games, Boston Bruins were poised tonight for their second engagement with Montreal Maroons this time before their hometown fans.

As the Montreal National Hockey League outfit headed for Boston with Manager Tommy Gorman's assertion that "We'll give them a battle," the Bruins declared themselves ready to meet anything Maroons can offer.

"We will have the advantage of playing at home this time," said Manager Art Ross, "and we should be able to wipe out that 4-1 reverse in Montreal last night."

He said the all probability he would use the same lineup that met Maroons in Montreal.

Lewis, Dan, George and Bill are brothers and together with Jim Knox in Nova Scotia are probably the outstanding family of hockeyists in the Maritimes. Donald and Lester are brothers but no relation to the other family.
