RECOGNISING MARITIME PROVINCE RIGHTS.

From time to time in these columns we have claimed for the Maritime Provinces that compensation would be due to this section of Canada in case of the proposed extension of the boundaries of Quebec, Ontario and Manitoba, or either of them, or if Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta were to be given the public lands, forests and minerals within their borders. The claim was based upon the fact that the people of the older Provinces had supplied the money to purchase the entire Northwest Territory and also to open it up, develop it, build railways in it, support its mounted police and bring in immigrants. The claim was manifestly just and equitable, and in the case of the Maritime Provinces was the stronger from the natural impossibility of their boundaries being extended. But this claim, strong and just as it is in reason and equity had never been recognized until the present year. In the Laurier Government's scheme for the extension of the boundaries of the three central Provinces there was no hint of such compensation. Now the Borden Government has introduced a bill to extend the boundaries of Manitoba, Ontario and Quebec and has announced that this will in another session be followed by a measure to give to the three prairie Provinces the control of the lands and natural resources within their borders. Manitoba is to be first placed on an equal footing with Saskatchewan and Alberta in the matter of area and subsidies, and later all three Provinces will be given the crown lands and minerals. At this stage of the proceedings the claims of the Maritime Provinces must be taken into account if ever they were to be considered at all. It is due to some members of the pres-

ent Opposition, Hon. Dr. Pugsley among the number, to say that they put forward the claim of the Maritime Provinces to compensation, although now not in a position to implement their advocacy by administrative action. There is in fact practical unanimity in the Eastern Provinces and among their representatives as to the justice of this claim. Premier Borden during the discussion fully committed himself to this measure of justice to the East. In reply to Mr. Oliver and among other matters he said: "I would like to point out to my hon. friend (Mr. Oliver) that one of his own colleagues (Hon. Dr. Pugsley) on that side of the House has raised an important question this afternoon, and has expressed views with which perhaps my hon. friend (Mr. Oliver) may not be inclined to concur; namely, that when this question does come to be considered, some regard will have to be given to the claims of some other Provinces in Canada and especially the three Maritime Provinces whose boundaries have not been increased, whose boundaries cannot very well be increased on account of their natural situation. That is a matter that will have to be taken up in connection with the handing over of their natural resources to the three prairie Provinces. I would like my hon. friends from the Maritime Provinces to understand that that is a matter which has not escaped the attention of the Government." This is the first official recognition of our rights in this most important matter and it will bear fruit hereafter to the benefit of the Provinces by the sea. There is a precedent for it in the allotment made by the American Congress to the older States of a share in the lands of the vast Louisiana purchase, as was mentioned in this column some months ago.

SMALLPOX CASE ON STEAMER AT BOSTON.

BOSTON, Mar. 5—The Steamer Asclia which arrived at Portland, Maine, on Saturday night from London and Southampton with a case of smallpox in the third cabin, reached Boston harbor today. The first second cabin passengers landed at Portland but because of the limited quarantine facilities at that port, the steamer brought 530 passengers in the third cabin to Boston. They were examined and vaccinated and put in quarantine. Dr. Durgin, chairman of the Boston Board said the passengers found free of infection were not detained; the patient, a young Scandinavian, is to be treated at quarantine.

TRIBUTE OF RESPECT TO DEAD STATESMAN.

TORONTO, March 5—The Ontario legislature paid a tribute today to the memory of the late Hon. Edward Blake ignoring for the time its pressing program.

The members on both sides of the house silently concurred in a resolution to adjourn as an act of respect to the memory of the statesman who forty years ago directed the destinies of the province from the Legislature hall.

The Session lasted ten minutes, Sir James Whitney speaking for the government and Mr. Powell for the opposition.

THE BRITISH COAL STRIKE.

The great coal producing countries of the world are the United States, Great Britain and Germany. In the year 1908 their relative production in tons of 2,000 pounds each was: United States.....415,842,698 Great Britain.....292,887,144 Germany.....237,306,978 Austria Hungary comes next in the volume of production with 53,109,750 tons and France with over 40,000,000 tons, while the amount of coal produced in any other country is small, compared even with these. Between 1868 and 1908 the whole world's production of coal had increased 400 per cent, and has been rapidly increasing in recent years. Britain exported last year 64 million tons, besides supplying her enormous home demand, a large part of the export going to France. The effect of the British strike, should it continue, will be far-reaching. Britain will have to import coal. France must seek other sources

of supply, and these will make tremendous demands upon United States coal, which is also Canada's principal source of supply. Our own coal mines, rich as they are, do not produce quite half the coal consumed in Canada. To make matters worse, a general strike in the anthracite coal regions of the United States is now being engineered, and may take effect this spring. Very much therefore depends—how much can only be guessed—upon an early settlement of the British coal strike.

NOTES.

The sister Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick derive very considerable revenue from their great natural resources in minerals and lumber. Last year the revenue of Nova Scotia from its mines was \$647,606, of which \$591,557 was derived from the royalty on coal. The production of coal in the Province was 6,208,444 tons, of which about two million tons was consumed in the Province, a like quantity shipped to Quebec, over half a million tons was sent to New Brunswick and the balance chiefly to Newfoundland, St. Pierre and Prince Edward Island. The territorial revenue of New Brunswick in 1911 was \$528,439. The Province also derived \$6,695 from the royalty on coal, although not all the coal mined in New Brunswick pays a royalty.

The Republican party in the United States has in some ways lost a good deal of ground during the past three years. A Republican majority of sixty in the House of Representatives has been turned to a Democratic majority of seventy, while the Senate which was two-thirds Republican is now barely under control of that party. At present the feud between the Taft and Roosevelt factions threatens a complete disruption, but this may yet be averted. The coming Presidential election seems likely to be as bitterly contested as any since days of Lincoln.

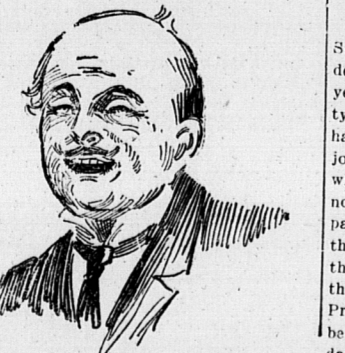
