NSWS FROM CHINA.—The Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions at New York has been advised of the safety of its other missionaries in southeastern Shanghai, China, where Dr. W. F. Seymour, of the board's hospital at Tsinning, was shot to death. Among the missionaries at Tsinning was Miss Mary Stewart, of Emmaire, Prince Edward Island. "Soldier shot Dr. Seymour through the heart," said a cable to the board from the Presbyterian China Council at Shanghai. "All others in Tsinning saved. Will leave as soon as possible."

AN INTERESTING VISITOR - Mr. Peter Kleinster, a native of Holland, is at the city on his second visit to Prince Edward Island. He is interested in dairying, an industry in which Holland has always been a leading part. He is an extensive traveller, having visited practically every country in the world. He arrived in Halifax Saturday morning by one of the Holland-American liners and in Charlottetown on Saturday evening. During the nine days' voyage they were given the best of the world in a newspaper, the board publishing daily on board and supplied with the world's current news by wireless.

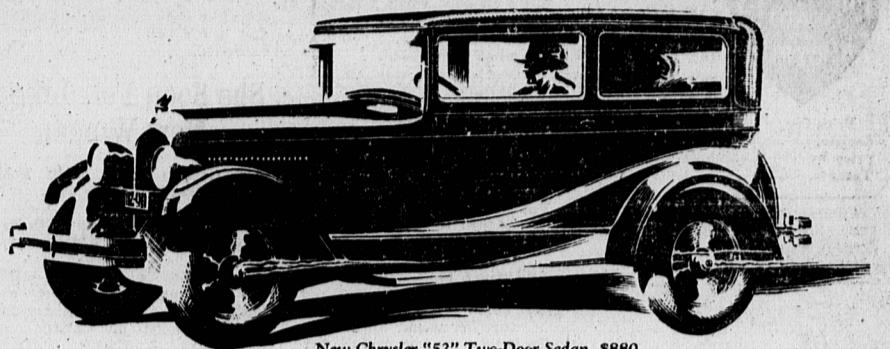
