**Finance**

NEW YORK, Feb. 25—(AP)—An insignificant amount of selling put the majority of stocks in slightly lower territory today but there were some wide swings in various issues touched by the news.

A striking exception to the faltering action was Douglas Aircraft which climbed 2 1-2 points at the best on the appearance of the company's report showing profits equal to \$30.29 a share for the fiscal year ended Nov. 30 compared with \$18.05 a share in the previous year.

Canadian stocks were mixed. McCreary Mines gained 3-4, International Nickel and Ford "B" 1-3, and Distillers-Seagram 1-4. Canadian Pacific lost 1-8 and Dome 1-4.

Stocks in the mining division at the close included U.S. Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors, Sears, Roebuck, General Electric, Eastman, Pejarco Sugar, Santa Fe, Southern Pacific, Standard Oil (NJ) and Texas Co. The last named dipping to a new 1941-42 low. Among gainers were Johns-Manville, United Aircraft and American Can.

**Toronto Exchange**

TORONTO, Feb. 25—(CP)—Mining shares turned a bit heavy this afternoon on the Toronto stock exchange after displaying early strength, and closed with an index loss of 16 showing for the golds and 16 for the base metals. The industrial and the western oils had slight margins on the up side. Trading was dull throughout the day and aggregate turnover was only 94,000 shares.

Senior golds led the moderate reaction after the group had registered gains in five consecutive sessions. Hollinger weakened 20 cents to 7.80 and Lake Shore 15 cents to 80. Wright-Hargreaves weakened 5 cents to 2.40, Sigma 30 cents to 4.70 for broken lots.

Base metal stocks had a dull day and prices were unchanged in the seniors but for a loss of 3-4 for Noranda for broken lots in the cheaper group Falconbridge was down 25 cents to 78 and Normetal was down 2 cents to 78. Steep Rock closed unchanged at 1.68 after touching 1.75.

A few new lows for the year were posted by the miscellaneous industrials. Wood Alexander and James weakened 6 points to 74 for a small lot. Easy Washing eased 7-8 to 2 1-8 and losses of a point or more were noted by Canada Mailing, Canada Wire B, Canadian Oil, Page-Hershey and Riverside Silk.

Bell Telephone firmed 1 1-4 to 145 1-4. Maple Leaf Milling pfd added 1-2. Massey-Harris pfd (old) gained 2 to 51 and Steel of Canada 1-2 to 61 1-2.

Calgary and Edmonton was the strongest of the western oils. It firmed 5 to 1.06. Minor losses were posted by Home Oil, Vulcan and Okalta. British-Dominion gained a cent to 23.

**MONTREAL EXCHANGE**

MONTREAL, Feb. 25—(CP)—Utilities showed the way to higher ground in light transfers today on the stock exchange and picked up some followers in metals. In other groups the changes were irregular. Stronger in utilities were Bell Telephone and Shawinigan while Montreal Power was higher for most of the session. Gattineau was down a bit.

International Nickel and Noranda edged forward fractions in metals but C.P.R. and Canada Steamship were losers in carriers.

Hamilton Bridge slipped to a new low in industrials and Dosco "B" moved up a little.

Imperial Tobacco sank to its lowest level since 1934 in miscellaneous and Ogilvie Flour was also softer. Distillers-Seagram was a stronger spot.

**Tax on Consumers of Tobacco**

**The Health Tax Act, 1941**

Effective as on and after the first day of March, 1942, a tax of ten percent on all tobacco, with the exception of black chewing tobacco, will be payable by all persons consuming or purchasing the same.

The Act requires that all Vendors of tobacco, in any form, must be in possession of a License authorizing them to sell tobacco and the tax of ten percent on the value of all tobacco sold must be collected by them at time of each retail sale.

Section 3 (Sub-section 3) of the Statute provides that "No wholesale vendor shall sell any tobacco in the Province for resale in the Province to a person who is not a vendor duly licensed under this Part."

Receipts for delivery to purchasers, showing amount of tax paid, will be supplied to Retail Vendors.

The minimum tax is 1c. In arriving at the tax, figure to the nearest half-cent; one-half or anything over the one-half cent is considered as a cent. Anything less is to be omitted.

As an example:—On a 12c purchase, ten percent is 1-2, or one and one-eighth cents. As the fraction is less than one-half, the fraction is omitted and the tax becomes 1c.

On a 25c purchase, ten percent is 2.5 or 2 1-2c which calls for 3c to be paid.

Wheat has been fed extensively to fattening lambs and wintering ewes. It is frequently fed in the un-ground state, although the hard milling grades should be coarsely ground or cracked for general sheep feeding. A mixture by weight of one part wheat and two parts oats would be suitable for ewes and for lambs during the early part of the fattening period.
