### POULTRY ASSOCIATION

tically responsible for a great deal of the executive work in connection with the circle organization and in particular with the opening of the candling stations, the case plan and the ready reckoner. The latter two are innovations and much credit is due to Mr. Hare for the careful and intelligent work done. He discussed and explained clearly the case plan which did away with stamping, but allowed for quality payment. Very often careless stamping gave considerable difficulty and the new plan would relieve the farmers of considerable detail work. The candling station was a necessity to get sufficient detailed information regarding the quality of the eggs—when shipped to dealers very often the returns were too meagre. It was of very great importance because the prevention of eggs would be possible—if all the circles undertook to market their eggs independently they would be in competition, whereas if the sale of all eggs was under central supervision, it would be quite easy to collect the necessary information. They would also have quite an accurate idea of the available supply and could cater to the better class trade where a regular supply was required. The quality from the association would be uniform and the standing of the island eggs would be much better. All island dealers will be intensely interested in this new movement because of the added status given to all eggs shipped to the large markets. The improved methods of handling on the farms will enable the dealers of better quality consequently they will be able to more easily supply their best customers.

### WEDNESDAY MORNING

Egg Trade Legislation.—Mr. J. Bradford Millman discussed this phase of the subject briefly. He pointed out that in the past imported Chinese eggs had been sold as Canadian products. Storage eggs from circles or elsewhere have been marketed as new laid and this particularly was an injustice especially to people who were seeking markets due to quality of their products. He advocated legislation which would compel proper labelling.

Mr. W. A. Brown, Chief of the Poultry Division of the Live Stock Branch agreed with Mr. Millman and pointed out that if legislation was to be secured the producers must place themselves on record. He looks forward to the future when Canada will once more be an exporter of eggs rather than an importer. The Canadian West at one time was

an excellent market, but now the West can supply its own eggs. Gt. Britain is a great importer and secures many from the nations at war and others peculiarly interested.

If Canada is to widen her markets then it will be necessary to adopt the quality standard. He urged some action on the part of the meeting.

Mr. Brown briefly outlined the work of the poultry division and noted the great possibilities in the Canadian west to carry on similar work as was being followed in P. E. Island. The national character of their work was emphasized forcibly and that they were not able to concentrate all their attention in the East and allow the great west to suffer. The large amounts of capital tied up in the railways demanded developments in the west and also demanded that trade be directed east and west rather than north and south. However this could not be done without men. The department had carefully considered the situation and felt that Mr. Benson might be moved to the west now that the organization in the Island had advanced so successfully.

Messrs. E. B. McLaren, Cornelius McLellan, John A. Devar, Mr. L. A., protested very vigorously against the action of the department because it was very important that Mr. Benson be allowed to remain and complete the organization inaugurated. Mr. J. Bradford Millman protested, but was willing to meet Mr. Brown providing Mr. Benson remained for some time yet. Rev. J. J. McDonald upheld the contention that Mr. Benson should remain arguing that he had won the confidence of the farmers and that if salary was the object it could be arranged.

The result was the framing of the resolution and without doubt the situation will remain unchanged. Mr. Benson discussed the possibilities of co-operative crate fattening, instead of selling poultry in the usual way. He advocated strongly the raising of that class of birds which would be sufficiently large to be successfully fattened. Two weeks of feeding would enhance the price very greatly. The Charlottetown candling station could be used as a depot. There was probably nearly as great a field in this phase of poultry raising as in the handling of eggs.
