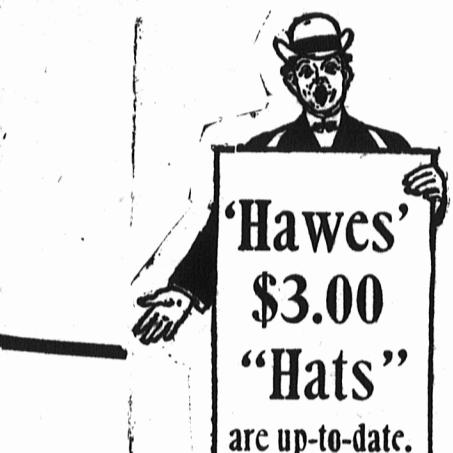
A small house being erected by Jeffery Jerrior was moved from its foundation and somewhat wrecked. No damage of any consequence however was committed.
