Workers Protest Calles' Return To Mexico

By Clark Lee, Associated Press Foreign Staff (By Guardian's Special Wire) MEXICO, D.F., Dec. 23.—President Lazaro Cardenas told 80,000 cheering workers today that Mexico's government, supported by its army and solid masses of workers and peasants, sees no threat to its program or to the nation in the presence of General Calles. The workers massed in front of the National Palace to demand expulsion of the former President from Mexico, but Cardenas told them that was unnecessary.

Abide With Me

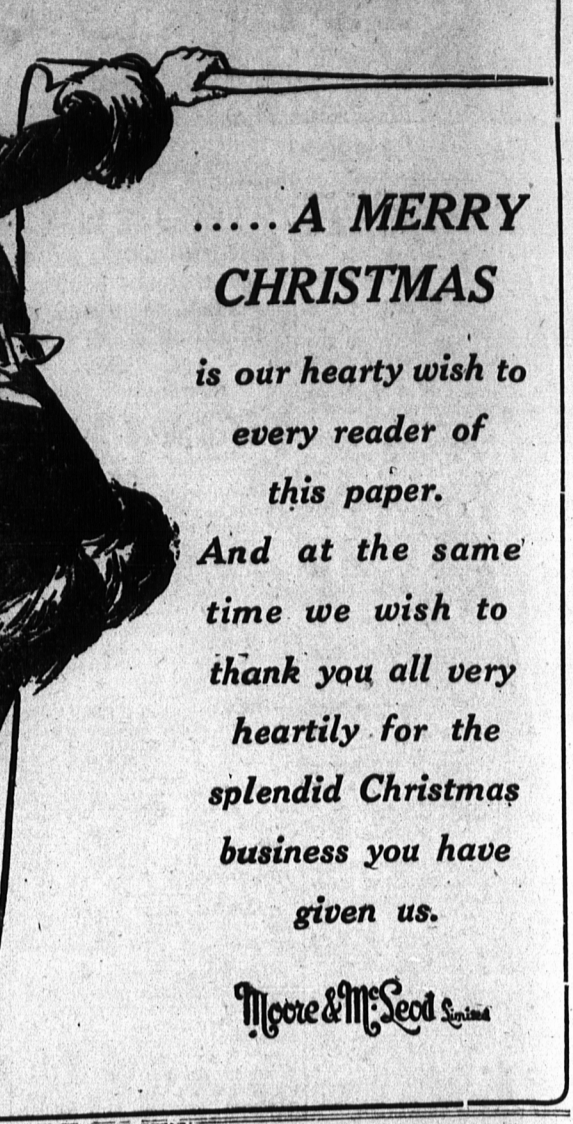
