NEW INDUSTRY.—A man named Doggett is considering going into the live lobster business in Pictou, says a Pictou exchange, shipping to the Upper Canadian market. He has been in this business around Souris and Georgetown and is said to have done fairly well at it. The fish would be bought from local fishermen, kept in salt water tanks until a shipment was ready, and then sent forward on ice and eel grass. The operation of the refrigerator would enable the business to be carried on successfully.

COMING CURLERS.—A letter from Mr. Dodd Dwyer, President and Mr. D. Patterson, Secretary of the new Caledonia Club, Pictou, received by the Secretary of the Charlottetown Club, announced the acceptance with pleasure of the latter's invitation for a friendly match at Charlottetown. The date of the match although not yet definite will likely be Monday, Tuesday, 16th or 17th inst. Mr. Grant also received a letter from Chief McKenzie of the Truro Club, saying they had asked for volunteers for a trip to Charlottetown and expected to send over two or three lads. New Glasgow an Antigonish have also been invited but have not been heard from.

MUST STAMP LETTERS.—The Post Office Department has found that the practice of placing money in rural mail boxes to pay postage on mail matter is an objectionable one and the Inspectors are authorized to take steps to discourage this practice which has caused a great hardship to the couriers, and adds considerably to the arduousness of their tasks. It is also found to be an unnecessary hardship and the cause of frequent delays to have the couriers obliged to wait to supply a boxholder with one or two cents worth of postage stamps and it has therefore been decided that couriers should not be compelled to sell stamps in quantities to the value of less than 25c. Rural patrons must therefore see that these instructions are observed, for in future if letters are put in boxes without the necessary postage stamps affixed they will be liable to be sent to the Dead Letter Office. 1163.
