**YNOPS IS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS**  
 Any even numbered section of Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of the family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section 160 acres, more or less.  
 Applications for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Land Agency or Sub-agency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may however, be made at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of any intending homesteader.  
 The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following plans.  
 (1) At least six months residence upon the cultivation of the land in each year for three years.  
 (2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.  
 (3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered by him in the vicinity such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father, or mother.  
 (4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowances crossed in the measurement.  
 (5) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.  
 Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of intention to apply for patent.

 —In a letter received from Capt. Rhyndar of the ferry steamer Bedoune he says he has been delayed by the Inspector of steamboats, whose visit was not made as early as promised. Capt. Rhyndar expected when writing to leave for Summerside in a few days.

—The regular monthly meeting of the town Council took place in the Council Chamber Summerside Monday night last all the Councilors being present. In the absence Mayor Compton, Councillor Manso occupied the chair. Bills to the amount of \$710.23 were passed and orders were passed from Albert Groomer to a wire the warehouse on town what for \$6.50, was accepted. A letter from the Board of underwriters concerning the wiring of Market Street was received and referred to the Property committee. A bill for \$2 dollars from J. E. Egan for use of right of way was held over. It was ordered that the light recently placed on East Street be discontinued. The fire and light committee asked for more time to report on Willow Ave light, which was granted. An offer from Jos. Read & Co., leasing their barn to the town for use as a stable at \$5 per year for a term of three years was accepted. A communication from the Local Government presenting to the town the building for use as a contagious hospital was received. A vote of thanks was passed to the Government. A petition for a light on South Market Street was referred to the fire and light committee. The poll tax for the current year was placed at \$2, and the assessment at \$8 per \$1000. No further business the Council adjourned.
