LARGE CONGREGATION HEARD REV. CODY
 GENEVA, Sept. 16.—An exceptionally large congregation yesterday heard Rev. Dr. H. J. Cody, rector of St. Paul's Church, Toronto, preach the annual sermon in English in connection with the opening of the League of Nations Assembly here. The gathering was comprised largely of people from Great Britain the British Dominion and the United States, and included the delegates from the various Dominions.
 Prominent in the British delegation present were Viscount Cecil and Sir Malcolm Delevigne, assistant Under-Secretary of State, Home Office.
 Chaplains of English, Scottish American and Swiss churches assisted in the service.
 The service was held in the ancient and historic cathedral of St. Peter, and Canon Cody preached from the same pulpit from which the great religious reformers Calvin and Knox had preached. Dr. Cody dwelt on the ideals of the League of Nations and he alluded to the importance of the recent entrance of Germany into the League.

LEFT A LIST OF MEN WHO WERE SLATED FOR DEATH
 WINNIPEG, Sept. 16.—Leaving a list of men slated "for death" Ross Little a farmer of the Roblin district North-west of Winnipeg, left his home armed with a shotgun Sunday and today provincial police are scouring the countryside.
 One man has been shot, and now is in the Dauphin hospital in a serious condition. He is James Munroe, 70 a neighbor of Little's and six other men were named on the "death list" found in Little's home this morning. Police declared that Little is demented, following financial worries, and has sought revenge for fancied wrongs.
 Little visited the home of Munroe late Sunday night. As Munroe opened the door the demented man commenced firing. Munroe was struck in the arm, and attacked with the butt-end of the gun. The aged man succeeded in knocking his assailant off the steps and closed the door. Little continued to fire through the door according to the police report received here and when Munroe secured his gun the two men exchanged several shots. Little escaped unharmed. As he left the farm he shot one of the farmer's dogs.
 The police have no trace of the crazed man but a wide search is being conducted through the district to-day.
