The market was fairly well attended yesterday. Butter was selling at twenty-five to twenty-six cents per lb., eggs at thirty cents per doz., ducks seventy-five to one dollar and chickens at fifty to seventy-five cents per pair, geese at ninety to one ten each, loose straw at thirty to thirty-five and loose hay at forty-five to fifty cents, pressed straw at five dollars to six dollars and pressed hay at eight fifty per ton, potatoes at twenty to twenty-one cents per bus., black oats at forty to forty-one and white at thirty-eight cents per bus.

A very interesting athletic event took place Wednesday night at the City Building corner, in the form of a race between Charles Curtis and one of the fastest sprinters of the Salvage corps. We refrain from mentioning his name as he is well known in athletic circles, and his defeat would forever outclass him from ever hoping to remain in fast company. This race was talked of some time ago, but the managers of the men could not agree on the distance. Mr. Curtis' manager wanted a long distance, and the sprinter's manager wanted a short distance of course. Finally the distance was set, starting at City Building corner to Government house and back. It was a circus and Charles won easily. After the race the medal was presented by Chief Ranahan, of the Fire Department, and Charles is proudly wearing the medal today.
