IN CHARGE OF FINANCES

Prov. Treas. of Manitoba Gets Position with Winnipeg Electric

WINNIPEG, Dec. 29.—Hon. F. M. Black, Provincial Treasurer of Manitoba, has resigned his portfolio in the Bracken Cabinet to become vice-president in charge of finance of the Winnipeg Electric Co. It is announced this afternoon that Mr. Black before entering the Government was treasurer of the United Grain Growers, Ltd.

A statement issued by the Winnipeg Electric said that in view of the growth and development of the company and its subsidiaries, it had been considered advisable to have associated with the enterprise some person of broad financial experience who could devote all his time to that branch, and with this object in view the position of vice-president in charge of finances had been created and offered to and accepted by Mr. Black.
