DELAY OF THE NEW STEAMER.

There was considerable discussion in the House of Commons last Tuesday on the vote of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars for the proposed new winter steamer for Prince Edward Island in which a number of our federal representatives took part. After the ground was cleared Hon. Mr. Brodeur stated that the new steamer was planned to be two hundred and fifty feet long, forty-six ft. broad, twenty-seven feet deep, eight-hundred feet draft, one thousand eight hundred tons and six thousand horse power. The plans are complete for tendering and tenders have been called for. Several builders had expressed their intention of tendering. Mr. Brodeur said in regard to it he had taken the advice of builders in both England and Germany.

Mr. Lefurgey pointed out that the delay in calling for tenders would prevent the boat being ready for use next winter and commented severely on the inactivity of the department. He could not understand how the builders in Europe could give assurance that the new boat would keep the route open. They could not know the conditions in the Straits of Northumberland. After thirty years the Department of Marine did not seem to understand them. Mr. Brodeur replied that he had with him Capt. Brown of the Stanley and Mr. Ferguson, engineer, and they had assured him that a boat of six thousand horse power would cope with the situation perfectly. Mr. Brodeur neither denied nor explained why the steamer would not be ready for next winter's work.

The discussion then drifted away to the desirability of Canada building her own ice-breakers, and encouraging steel shipbuilding in this country generally. So it seems that after all the blockades of 1903 and 1905, and all the protests and remonstrances of our people in that connection, we are not likely to have the new steamer till two years hence. And this because of the dilatoriness of the Department of Marine. The new steamer ought to be now on the route. There is no half decent excuse for not having her ready at the beginning of next winter. But to keep us waiting two years yet is to impose a tax upon our patience and forbearance which savors of insult.

AGAINST THE TREATING SYSTEM.

Mr. Whyte, second Vice President of the Canadian Pacific Railway, noted for his ability and practical wisdom as a railway man, was recently one of delegation that waited upon the Manitoba Government to urge that the bars in that Province shall be closed at 6 o'clock. In the course of his remarks as reported he made a vigorous attack upon the treating system and declared his belief that liquor was responsible for the majority of railway accidents. These are not the statements of a "temperance fanatic," but the weighty deliverance of a man of moderate judgment, high in official authority and with abundant information in regard to the subject dealt with.

MR. BRYAN IN CANADA.

The recent visit of William Jennings Bryan to Montreal and Toronto is of interest in several ways. In the first place he is a candidate of one of the two great parties in his own country for the office of President of the Republic, and in the next place this is the year in which the election is to take place. It is therefore remarkable that he could find time in the midst of his campaign to visit and talk to the people of a neighboring country. And his visit is of the more value from the strong interest and friendly appreciation which Mr. Bryan has expressed and which he evidently feels in Canada and the Canadian people.

He was most enthusiastically received and he appears to have produced a most favorable impression upon those who heard him. The Canadian press of all shades has expressed golden opinions of the eloquent and versatile visitor. They found him vastly well informed on all the great questions of the day, broad-minded, humanitarian, reverent toward higher things and full of good will to everybody. His visit will add to the interest of Canadians in the presidential contest, and whether Mr. Bryan succeeds or fails in his aspirations to the Chief Magistracy, the better acquaintance now formed will tend in no small way to perpetuate good feeling between the two neighboring English-speaking countries.

His addresses in Toronto covered a great deal of ground and he touched upon many topics incidentally, aside from the main subjects discussed. For instance, in addressing the students of Toronto University, he made a sarcastic reference to the theory of the ascent of man from a lower order of animal life. Said he: "If any man can find any pride or pleasure in tracing his ancestry back to the monkey, I would not rob him of the satisfaction that he gets out of it. He will certainly not connect me with his family tree without more evidence." This is not conclusive logic, but it is entirely in the popular vein, of which Mr. Bryan is a shrewd interpreter.

ISLAND CLAIMS.

We shall hear more of the Island claims against the Dominion Government at the approaching session of the Legislature. We have several good claims, but judging from the past our claims are better than are the chances of an early and satisfactory settlement of them. After eleven years, with mutually friendly Governments at Ottawa and Charlottetown there ought now to be no financial questions at issue. A supreme effort should now be made, and we trust will be made to reach the stage of finality on a just basis in regard to all these matters, that our people may know just where we stand.

Beyond all question the strongest largest claim we have is for the damages accrued for the nonfulfillment of the terms of union in regard to winter communication since the settlement of 1901, in which the rightfulness of our claim was admitted and some payment made to that date. The Ottawa Government has since admitted the inadequacy of the present steamers and have promised another. Owing to the federal default the damages have been rolling up for six or seven

years past. Claim for these damages should be made yearly and insisted upon in the strongest way on the double ground of its admitted justice and the Island's great need for the money.

A WARNING FROM THE WEST.

Dear Sir:—No doubt at this time of the year when winter shows up at its worst in Prince Edward Island, many a youth as he sits by the fire in his comfortable Island home, is planning a trip to the "Golden West" in the spring and thinking of the fortunes to be made there, and it is to drive this erroneous idea out of his head that I write this letter. There are thousands of idle men walking the streets of this city at present, skilled mechanics among them some of them have been idle since November. I met a young man (an Islander) on the street the other day he did not have enough to pay his weekly room rent, his is a tradesman and a good sober one too, he told me that he only got about ten days work since November. And that last summer when he was working for fair pay he fell into the clutches of one of the real estate men of whom (there are more in this town than I have ever seen in any town of its size) sold him a lot some where out in the woods for a good big price so much down and so much a month. This, of course, took most of his savings; then came the dull times, when a man might almost as well go out and ask for money as ask for work.

Young men, if you know when you are comfortable and well off stay on P.E. Island. It will hold its own with any part of Canada that I have seen and I have seen several parts of it.

I met a gentleman the other day who left P.E. Island perhaps 10 years ago, and is now pretty well posted on conditions out here. I spoke to him about some young men from home who might come this way in the spring. He threw up both hands and said, "Tell them for me to stay where they are if they know when they are well off."

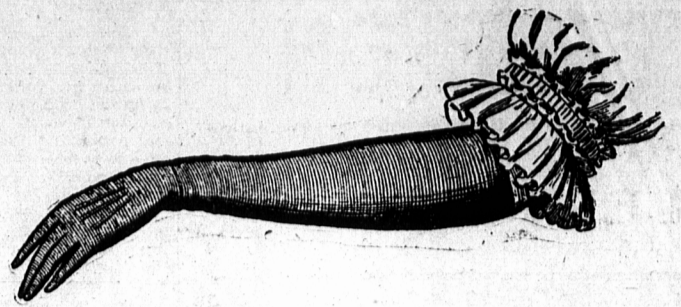
