**SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON**

REVIEW.  
JESUS THE JUDGE OF MEN.  
LESSON. John iii. 14-21.  
GOLDEN TEXT. Revelation iii. 11.

"I come quickly; hold fast that which thou hast, that no one take thy crown."

**THE NARRATIVE.**

In our first quarter's lessons the dominant note was that of Jesus as the great teacher. In the second He was presented as the great Saviour. In this He has appeared as the great Judge. The whole of the lessons have been concerned with matters which transpired during the last months, we may almost say weeks; and they have presented Him to us as, in the midst of determined hostility, He has proceeded against it in strict justice and without any faltering.

The passage from the Gospel of John appointed for our reading to-day is remarkable in that while in it is declared that He came not to judge the world, and while it defines His present ministry in grace, it does reveal most clearly the principles upon which He is constantly the Judge, and upon which He will finally act in judgment.

Let us rapidly review the lessons. In the first we considered the parable of the laborers, in which He taught His disciples that the true motive in service is that of fidelity and not that of reward. He thus prepared the way for some of the denunciations of the rulers to which they would listen.

The second lesson dealt with the question of association with Himself in power. He taught His disciples the method and true value of service, and showed them that the way of greatness is that of service.

We came next to the story of Bartimaeus, a radiant illustration of His activity of mercy, even in the midst of a ministry of judgment.

In our fourth lesson we studied the parables of the pounds and the talents, both of them spoken to His disciples, and pre-eminently dealing with their responsibilities to Himself in coming days.

All these were spoken as He quietly approached the city. The hour in which He would find the verdict and pass the sentence upon the chosen people, was at hand.

In the fifth lesson we had to do directly with that ministry of judgment. In the first we considered the preparatory signs and teaching; the blasting of the fig tree, and the cleansing of the Temple.

In the next we heard Him compelling the rulers to define their own failure, and pass sentence upon it; and then uttering the solemn actual words by which in the economy of God the Hebrew people were set aside from service.

In the next we considered the parable of the marriage feast in which He unfolded the whole process of Divine invitation and human rejection in those three stages.

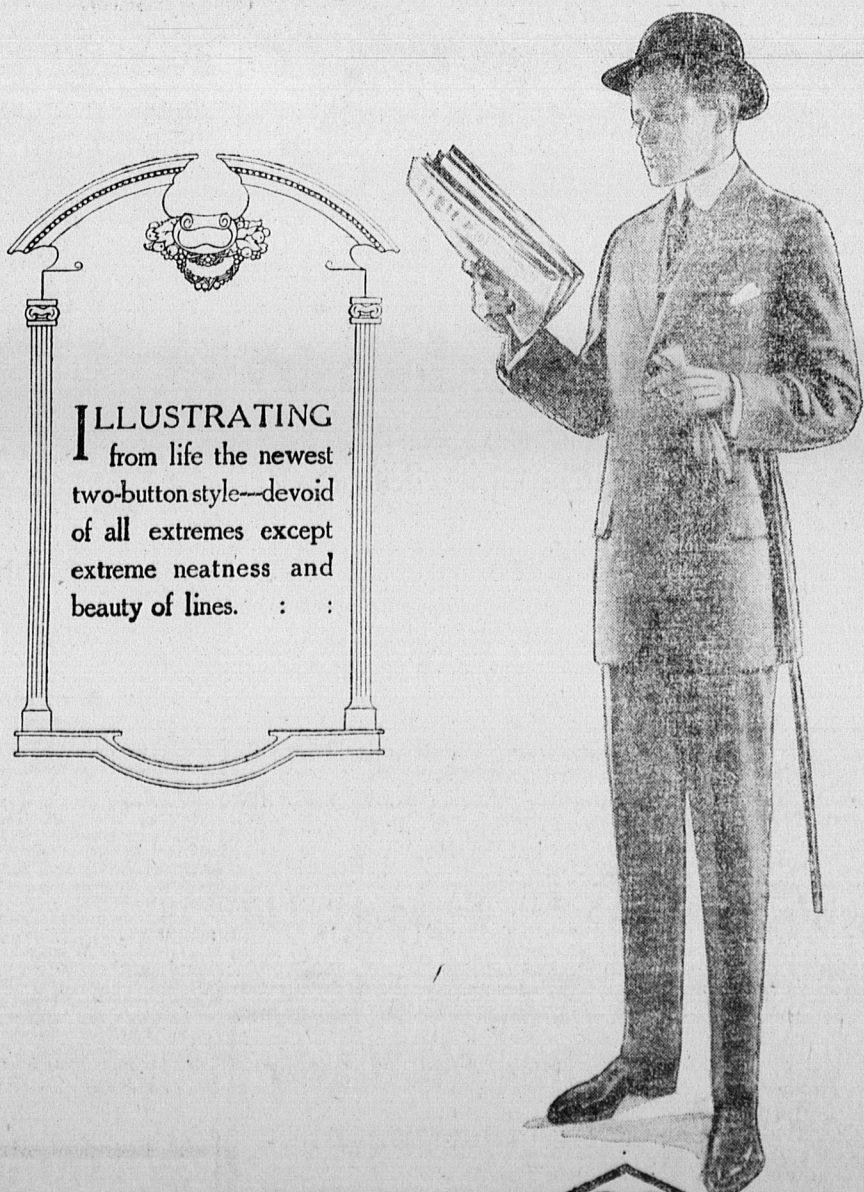
The next was occupied with the political inquiry, which He answered by setting forth important State relationships in right relation with the fundamental fact of the Kingship of God.

The last of these lessons in the actual sealm of this controversy was that in which we heard Him dealing with the fundamental question of law, and enunciating its master principle of love.

Our last two lessons had to do with His teaching of His own in the great Olivet prophecy; the first, the parable of the virgins, showing the responsibilities of His people while He is absent; and the second, the prediction of the judgment of the nations, revealing the way in which He will commence the administration which will issue in the establishment of the Kingdom.

The supreme value of all the lessons of this quarter is the revelation which they afford of the fact that our Lord's coming to Jerusalem and to death was not that of a victim who was mastered by circumstances, and could not escape; but that of a king, who was marching along a pathway which He perfectly understood, resolutely toward a passion through which He would accomplish the purposes of God, but always in the light of the ultimate victory.
