The parlour will be greatly appreciated by strangers and others who have not suitable accommodation for a funeral service. Among various other improvements which Mr. Compton has in view is the enlarging of the old furniture store on the Corner of Central and Front Streets, by the addition of another storey the upper part of which may be used as a Hall or Lodge Room. His friends congratulate Mr. H. Compton and Sons up on their enterprising movements, which will greatly add to the improvement of Summerside.
