9th Argylls, was paid by Lance Corporal Crawford, of that battalion, who is at present in Craigleith Hospital.

Lance Corporal Crawford, who was out of the fighting zone before his Colonel was killed in action, and it was with much regret that he heard of his death. "He was very popular among the boys since he came to us. We liked him. He was a man who was not afraid to take his risks. In fact, he thought more about the men than he did himself. That's the truth. A little while ago he was wounded, but it was just a scratch on the face. I'm sorry that chaps killed for he was very popular with the men."

A SNIPER "FARMER."

Sergeant R. H. Richmond, of the 5th Black Watch, whose wife resides in Maule street, Arbroath, is now lying in hospital at Dundee. He writes, with regard to the snipers, that for days the Dundee and Angus men were baffled to know where the bullets came from on passing a certain place. The only persons working about were a few peasants working in the fields; but the occurrence was becoming too persistent to be pleasant. A party of six men boldly marched along the road a few paces apart. Nothing happened. When out of sight of the industrious peasants five of the men concealed themselves, while the other retraced his steps. Half way along the road he was met with the usual "ping, ping, ping." His comrades observed the "farmer" drop his gun and continue to work as if nothing had happened. But he was too late. A volley rang out and he was dead.
