—**DECREASE IN Turkey Production Is Reported**

A marked decrease in the quantity of turkeys produced and marketed in this province was reported by Mr. Leonard McDonald, manager of the Prince Edward Island Cooperative Egg and Poultry Association. The down slide in production became noticeable about 1932, Mr. McDonald said.

Difficulty of raising the birds because of disease and other factors and a belief by farmers there was "no profit" in that line of poultry were given as principal reasons for the decline.

While no figures were available for the total quantity shipped, the producing areas in the province in 1939 turkey production was only about one-tenth of what it had been in the early 1930's in some of the principal turkey producing districts in the province.

Prince County has been known as containing the largest turkey producing area in the province. In 1939 turkey producers in O'Leary district, one of the largest in the province were hard hit by disease.

Many farmers had discontinued raising turkeys because of the difficulty of keeping the birds from ranging over neighboring grain fields and causing damage.

One producer in the province has adopted the American plan of raising the birds in small pens with wire bottoms. He is Herbert Matthews of Alberton.

into the hands of the people. Even if there is over subscription in the first day or two, the books will remain open in order to allow time for the small investors to get their applications on record, the minister told newspapermen tonight.

With 66,000 Canadians already under arms in the land forces alone, a naval service that had won praise from the British Admiralty, and a rapidly increasing air force, Canada's war effort would cost \$1,000,000 a day for the first year.

Will Buy Equipment  
 Money invested in these bonds, Col. Ralston said in his speech, "will buy equipment for the army, ships for the navy, planes for the air force."

"Your money, in fact, is essential to enable our men to fight in a way worthy of Canadians. Dollars will save lives. You must save dollars."

The finance minister drew a heartening picture of economic improvement throughout the Dominion resulting from normal improvement in trade as well as from war-time activities.

"We Canadians can buy all the Canadian bonds that must be sold in this war. Our savings and our ability to save are evident."

Col. Ralston quoted figures showing there was more than \$1,700,000,000 in Canadian chartered banks, credited to more than 4,000,000 individual accounts.

Many of these accounts were small but any person with savings could do himself and his country a service by investing in war bonds which will be in denominations as low as \$50.

Employment Increasing  
 Employment is increasing and "what was a moderate economic revival before the war has turned into a rapid economic advance under the stimulation of wartime activity."

United Kingdom purchases in Canada during the first year of the war will probably be in the neighborhood of from \$400,000,000 to \$500,000,000, an increase of possibly \$100,000,000 over 1938, the minister said.

Cost of the Canadian war effort for the first year would be approximately \$375,000,000. In addition the Canadian government, by repatriation of Dominion securities held in England, had made available \$100,000,000 in Canadian money for purchase of supplies by the United Kingdom in this Dominion.

To patriotic Canadians whose lot in this war is to stay at home and pursue normal activities, Col. Ralston said: "One of the most practical and effective ways for you to satisfy that patriotic urge and take a direct part in the war is by subscribing all you can to this loan."

He described the bonds which will bear 1-4 per cent interest from Feb. 1, 1940 they will be redeemable in 20 per cent lots to be decided by an annual draw, starting Feb. 1, 1948, and on each Feb. 1, until \$100,000,000 in Canadian money is redeemed at a premium of one per cent. The 1951 redemption will be at a premium of half of one per cent and the three previous redemptions at par. The bonds will be sold at par.

Canada's Interest  
 Mr. LaPointe stressed the importance to Canada of victory over the forces opposing the British and French Allies. Canada would be an ideal candidate for a victor's enemy. He said:

"And if we contemplate the terrifying possibility of defeat, how can we not realize the vital importance of an Allied victory?"

"Canada has entered this war of her own free will. By virtue of this same autonomy she could have stayed neutral, and she could get out of it now if she would assume the responsibility of cutting off some vital ties which are her best guarantee of security and her assurance of a place in the future among the nations of the world."

"Canada is at war to safeguard her freedom, to defend it with determination as the soldier fights to hold every single inch of his native land."

"We fight Hitlerism and Communism because we hate, from the bottom of our hearts, their brutal and destructive philosophy."

—**SENATOR DUFF SAYS MICHAUD IDLE MINISTER**

Liberal Senator Calls Upon Minister To Resign, "Did Nothing" in Four Years, Claim.

LUNENBURG, Jan. 14—Fisheries Minister Hon. J. E. Michaud's "failure and inaction in doing nothing in the four years he has held the portfolio connected with one of the most important productive industries in Canada proves conclusively that the time has arrived when personal considerations must be waived and the industry as a whole considered."

The newspapers carried a dispatch from Ottawa dated the 11th which states that the Minister of Fisheries, Mr. Michaud, said he saw no way in which his resignation as suggested by myself could help bring about new trade treaties and tariff changes, which I avowed were necessary to aid the fishing industry and that there was no indication that the minister of Fisheries had been opposed to the adoption of such policies, stated Senator Duff.

"It is quite true that there has been no indication that the minister has been opposed to the adoption of policies suggested by me, but the minister's failure and inaction in doing nothing in the four years that he has held the portfolio connected with one of the most important productive industries in Canada proves conclusively that the time has arrived when personal considerations must be waived and the industry as a whole considered."

"Any criticism by me or any one else," states Senator Duff, "are fully justified in view of the fact that for the last four years, and it will remove the sting from my remarks, at the least number of years have been due to the fact that not this government alone but other governments have neglected proper interest in this great industry or have had men at its head who could deal intelligently with its problems. It is over twelve years since the Deputy Minister of Fisheries resigned and the present Minister of Fisheries has not only not appointed a deputy in his place, but evidently no other member of the government has taken enough interest in the matter to wonder why such deputy was not appointed, but an official who during the last year has acted in that capacity in spite of ill health, has not acted upon a decent emolument from the fisheries department or the government only draws the same amount as he has usually drawn as an official of the department in another capacity."

leaders among those under arrest were John F. Cassidy, leader of the Christian Front and addressed by his followers as "Fuhrrer," and William Gerald Bishop, leader of the sports club which acted as a secret entity behind the front.

Confiscate Arms  
 F. B. I. Agents in several raids confiscated completed and uncompleted bombs, a number of rifles and thousands of rounds of ammunition, Hoover said.

He added the alleged conspiracy was at least six months old.

The P. B. I. Agent used cameras with telescopic lenses to make pictures of drills in the handling of arms and instruction in ledge shops at a camp Hoover said was at Narrowsburg, 100 miles upstate from New York City.

Given Nazi Salute  
 The investigation showed, Hoover said, that Cassidy was always met by his followers with a salute similar to that of the Nazis.

Hoover said the investigation still is in progress particularly in the search for additional caches of armament for Christian Front armies elsewhere.

He declined to discuss the possibility of the Front's connection with foreign agencies or any alliances with other groups in the United States.
