A PROGRESSIVE MARITIME SCENERY

Sir,—Mr. J. M. Mardie, B. Sc., M. E. I. C., chief engineer of the Canadian National Party, with headquarters at Banff, Alberta, recently reported that "in 1925, 334,400 persons visited our National Parks," and that in the season of 1926, this figure had practically been reached by the end of August. Allowing, he says, an expenditure of \$100 by each of the foreign visitors, there was received at the three Western Parks—viz. Banff, Jasper, and Waterton Lakes—a total foreign tourist expenditure of \$33,440,000 in the years 1925 and 1926, respectively.

The immense hills and rocks of the Great West are certainly very attractive to the residents of Canada and America who are within reach of them by motor or rail; and the National Parks have been supplied with ample hotel accommodations and other requirements of summer visitors. But, having seen both, I don't think that they are really more attractive naturally than the hill and lake and river scenery of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Cape Breton and the varied and extensive landscapes of the Garden Province. Prince Edward Island, are to the residents of Eastern Canada and Eastern America.

Given a sufficient number of well managed and well kept hotels, and supplied with good roads for motor traffic there seems to be no good reason why these Eastern Provinces should not be visited every year by as many tourists as the mountains and streams of the West. These tourists who like to be cheered on their way by an occasional drink of "liquor," such as they obtain in the Great West and in Quebec and Ontario, will of course not come to Nova Scotia or the twin islands of Cape Breton and P. E. Island or spend their money in these Maritimes. But there are an increasing number of motorists who feel that it is safer and really pleasanter upon the whole, to avoid the use of intoxicants, and given other attractions, additional to those which will come here every year to enjoy the holidays and the splendid and charming scenery which nature has so liberally provided.


