THE sewerage men while digging on Cumberland street found springs of water so strong that the pump they had was not large enough to keep the water out. A new pump was procured from St. John and proved sufficient for the occasion.

SINCE the seizure of two cattle in Montreal diseased with lump-jaw there have been six additional seizures of cattle there having the same malady. One of these was about to be slaughtered at the abattoir when Dr. Laberge, the alert Inspector, confiscated it.

EARL MINTO is expected in Halifax at the end of August for his first visit east of Quebec. The military authorities are planning for a grand tournament to last three days, to be given on the occasion of His Excellency's visit. The display is scheduled to take place in the new armory building on August 30, 31, and September 1.

There is prospect of trouble among the lobster factories on the French Shore of Newfoundland owing to the fact that the Legislature failed to pass an act to continue to the French fishermen the privilege accorded them by the act of last year which has now expired. The Legislature has been prorogued. Newfoundland lobster fishermen are now disposed to assert an exclusive right to the lobster fisheries on the Shore, and collisions with the French are thought to be inevitable.

THE Foresters tea at Coleman, notwithstanding the rain in the forenoon, was a grand success. The afternoon was fine and the county generally took advantage of the temporary sunshine and drove to the tea. It is estimated that there were 2,000 people present many of them having come by special train from the east but the majority from the surrounding country. The tables were provided with all the good things available, and the people of Coleman have added a good deal to their reputation for hospitality and entertainment. Addresses were given by Mr. H. A. Collins, Supreme Treasurer, I. O. O. F. of Toronto, who is a very pleasing and articulate speaker and by Mr. J. M. LaRue, R. of P. E. Island. Both speakers having been introduced by Fr. Doctor McDougall. The special left at 6 o'clock for Charlottetown.

Fostering Trade By Britain and Canada.

IMPERIAL SUBSIDIES

Canadian Government Give Five Year Contract Via Halifax and St. John.

WASHINGTON, July 20.—Details of plans by the British Government for building up trade between the British West Indies and British ports, and also between Canada and the British West Indies, have been received here. They are in a letter from the Colonial Office in London to the West Indian committee, written under direction of Mr. Chamberlain, Secretary of the Colonies, explaining the plan of establishing new steamship lines, with subsidies paid in part by the Imperial Government and intended to link together the Mother Country and the colonies, as well as the colonies among themselves.

The matter is of special interest in connection with the recent negotiations between the United States and Great Britain on reciprocity with the British West Indies, as these colonies have shown a disposition to look to this country for trade as well as to the Mother Country or Canada. As to the line between Canada and the British West Indies, the letter to the Colonial Office says:—

As regards improved inter-insular service and an improved Canadian service, a contract will, it is hoped, shortly be concluded with the aid of an Imperial subsidy, between the Dominion Government and Messrs. Pictford and Black, which, it is hoped, will effect both objects. The contract is for a period of five years, the service to begin in July 1900, and the contractors will bind themselves to establish a fortnightly service from Halifax and St. John alternately to Trinidad and British Guiana at an average rate of ten knots per hour. The steamer will proceed alternately by way of Bermuda, St. Kitts, Antigua, Montserrat, Dominica, St. Lucia, Barbadoes, St. Vincent, Grenada, Tobago, to Trinidad; and by way of Bermuda, St. Lucia, Barbadoes, Trinidad to British Guiana.

The letter also gives the details of the contract already signed for a new steam service between Jamaica and Southampton. This service will begin in May, 1900, the steamers making fortnightly runs and having 15-knot speed. They will have a capacity for carrying 20,000 bunches of bananas, and white-intended special ly fruit carriers; they will take passengers also. A subsidy of \$10,000 per year is to be paid the line, the British Government paying half.
