CANADIAN GIRLS RECEIVE DIPLOMAS

St. Vincent's Sends Out Large Class of Graduate Nurses.

Commencement exercises of the School of Nursing on Thursday, June 3, was probably the most brilliant affair of the kind ever held at St. Vincent's Hospital, New York City, was the opinion of Rev. Monsignor Michael J. Lovelle, who presided and gave the closing address.

The processional march and the spirited rendering of the flag song by the chorus of student nurses made a very colorful opening of the Exercises. Martin Conboy, M. D., who addressed the graduating nurses, made an interesting appeal for the Christian virtue of Charity in the nursing profession. Dr. Geo. David Stewart, who presented the diplomas to the graduates, was in his happiest mood, and made this somewhat solemn duty a time of joy and gaiety. The school plus were presented by Mrs. Joseph Slevin, Jr., President of the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Hospital.

The graduating class which numbered 33, was an inspiring sight in their spotless white uniforms, adorned by corsage bouquets of red roses, interspersed with babies' breath, which were the gift of Dr. Ernest Fahenstock. Out of the class of 33, twelve were Canadian girls. The Valedictory was rendered by Miss Agatha O'Brien (St. Louis, P. E. I.) with such grace and poise and perfect enunciation as to receive the congratulations of the guests of the evening. In concluding the Valedictory, Miss O'Brien made the graduates for the class of 1926, that they would live up to the traditions of the training school as expressed on the school pin.—Patience, Fortitude, Preservation; to be true to their school motto—For God and humanity, and to observe faithfully and loyally the exhortations of the Nightingale pledge—which she then called upon the class to repeat in union.

Another interesting feature of the graduation week at the Hospital was the graduation Mass which was celebrated at 6.10 a.m. Thursday. The entire school assisted and received Holy Communion, for the success of the class of 1926. The music was rendered by a selected choir of junior nurses. As the auditorium of the nurses' residence has not been completed the usual graduation was not held.

Another feature was the class dinner at which the officers of the Alumnae meet the graduates, and the officers of the class of 1927 bids them God-speed. At the dinner the secrets of the past are revealed in the class history and the prophecies and the poem foretell the future. And then took place the time-honored custom of the handing over of the key of the training school by the President, Miss Agatha O'Brien, and its acceptance by the class of 1927.
