—A THUNDER STORM.—A thunder and hail storm second to none this season, was felt heavily in certain sections of Mont Carmel. In St. Raphael the effect was disastrous to the crop of grain which at this particular season is nearly ripe. The storm started so suddenly that many were terrified at the terrific crashes of thunder. At a certain interval, hail, the principal feature of the storm, descended with unlimited force, breaking dozens of window panes. It is reported that Mr. Sylvère Arsenault sustained a heavy loss in a field of wheat that was about ripe one of the best fields in the settlement. Messrs. Malise Arsenault, Joseph Arsenault, Elias Arsenault and others also experienced more or less heavy losses of grain crops. WILL GET ALL NEWS NOT AFFECTING WAR

Censorship in Britain Enlarged and Special News Officers Now at Front

LONDON, Sept. 12.—Home Secretary McKenna has taken charge of the work of the Official Press Bureau. In this connection he made the announcement yesterday in the House of Commons and to the United States, of news passed by the Press Bureau for the prompt transmission, to the Dominion and to the United States, of news passed by the Press Bureau for publication in this country. Everything passed by the censor for Great Britain could henceforth be sent to any part of the world.

In addition, Mr McKenna continued, officers had been appointed on the staff of Sir John French, the Commander-in-Chief of the British forces on the Continent, with the object of securing full information for publication. Mr McKenna declined to commit himself as to when war correspondents might be allowed to enter the zone of warfare.

"As our army is operating in the country of our allies and in conjunction with their forces," he declared, "it is proper that in this matter we should be guided by their views."

A MAGNIFICENT FRENCH SUCCESS.

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, Sept. 12.—According to an official announcement made here the third French army has captured all artillery of one German army corps. Aeroplanes report the enemy's retreat is very rapid. The artillery of the German army corps consists of two regiments and field pieces (eighteen batteries of field guns and six batteries of howitzers, total 72 pieces); one or two batteries of heavy field artillery and machine gun group.

BRITISH SUCCESS OF NEW GUINEA.

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, Sept. 12.—The Admiralty announced that the British fleet has occupied Hererishahoe, Bismark Archipelago, New Guinea.

CHASING THE GERMANS.

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, Sept. 12.—Our troops have crossed the River Our and are moving this (Saturday) morning in rapid pursuit of the enemy. It is an announcement given out today by the Official Press Bureau. "Two hundred prisoners were captured, the cavalry of the Allies were between Soissons and Fismes last night. The enemy are retreating north of Vitry-le-Francois."

STEAMER CAPTURED.

(Special to the Guardian.) SHANGHAI, Sept. 12.—Reports received here from Hong Kong declare that the British steamer Singa has been captured by a British warship twenty miles outside of Manila, at which point on the high seas she had taken on a load of tea from a German freighter.

AUSTRIAN LOSSES.

(Special to the Guardian.) PETROGRAD, Sept. 12.—The Austrian losses in the second battle in Galicia are estimated at 125,000, of whom about 80,000 are prisoners.

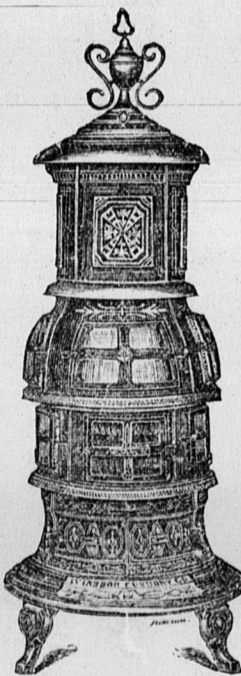
