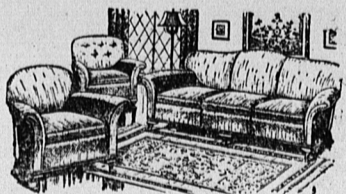

Stock Quotations

PRODUCE GRAIN

(Canadian Press) MONTRÉAL, Aug. 20.—Prices on the Montreal dairy and produce market during last week were irregular, with eggs displaying large gains, butter easing fractionally and other lines holding unchanged. The hog market ended the week 1/2 to 3 cents a dozen higher with grad's shipments in carlots or less bringing 21 to 22 cents for extras, 18 1/2 to 17 cents for firms and 13 to 14 cents for seconds. Weekly receipts totalled 5,500 cases as against 5,002 cases the previous week. No 1 grade butter in carlots or less ended the week at 18 1/2 to 19 1/2 cents a pound, 1/4 to 1/2 cents less than the previous week. Arrivals amounted to 17,835 boxes, nearly 1,000 lower than a week ago. A thousand boxes of Canadian butter was shipped to England last week from Montreal, the first export shipment of the year. This is more or less a trial shipment and more will follow if it brings a good price. Production of Canadian butter this year has been so light as to leave very little for export. The same week last year 1,900 boxes were exported.

Cheese prices were the same as at the close of the previous week. Ontario white and colored bringing 10 to 10 1/2 cents a pound with Quebec half a cent less. Receipts were 11,888 boxes while a week ago receipts were 32,723 boxes. Cheese exports for the week were 11,237 boxes, all going to the United Kingdom, British West Indies and St. John's, Nfld. During the corresponding week of last year 49,318 boxes were exported. The potato market ranged from 80 to 90 cents per 80 pound bag of new Quebec stock. New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island green mountain potatoes are now entirely off the market.

An officer of the Chasseurs D'Afrique crack French cavalry regiment, and well able to handle the most spirited horses, the Duke encountered difficulties in riding a wooden horse on carousel in Luna Park, the Coney Island of Paris.

LILY HAS 91 BLOOMS

MILLBROOK, Ont., August 20.—A golden banded Japanese lily, a plant rare in Canada, is attracting attention in the garden of Mrs. W. C. Allen here. The lily stands five and a half feet high and this year there are 16 stalks and 91 blooms, each about 10 1/2 inches across. The flower is white with yellow dots on the petals. 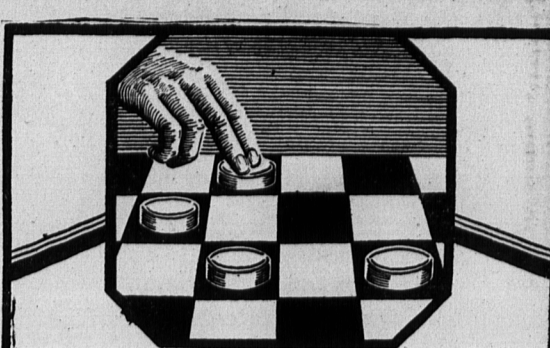

Canadian wheat in store in the United States amounted on August 4 to 6,881,185 bushels, as compared with 4,706,828 bushels on the same date last year.
