#### THE MINISTER OF MARINE AND FISHERIES.

In the new Conservative Cabinet the Maritime Provinces have but two members, Premier Borden being one and Hon. J. D. Hazen the other. This is in marked contrast with the earlier days of the Dominion when the eastern section of Canada always had four portfolios. The change grows out of the more rapid growth of Canada in the centre and west than in the east. And then there is the fact that the Premier is an eastern man and the Premiership is by far the most important position in the Government. In making his selection of a colleague from New Brunswick Mr. Borden has chosen well. Hon. J. D. Hazen is probably today the most influential figure in his native Province. Back in the nineties of last century he represented St. John County in the House of Commons. Later he entered local politics, became leader of the Opposition and on the overthrow of the Robison Administration in March, 1908, became the leader of the new Government.

As Premier of New Brunswick Mr. Hazen has distinctly made good. At the outset he surrounded himself with honest and capable colleagues, and has since introduced a number of important reforms. One of these was in the administration of the crown timber lands, where great abuses had crept in under previous Governments. These have been corrected and the revenue from this source nearly doubled, which was a matter of great importance, as the sister Province, like our own, suffered from insufficient funds for efficient housekeeping. Other reforms effected were in the auditing of public accounts, new checks upon the public expenditure, and an entire change in the road system, which has produced good results. It has been long since New Brunswick had a more capable and efficient Government than Mr. Hazen has given it, if indeed it ever had one of that stamp. Hon. Mr. Flemming, the Provincial Secretary, a comparatively young man of mark-

ed ability, succeeds to the Premiership of New Brunswick.

Hon. Mr. Hazen, in assuming the portfolio of Marine and Fisheries comes in direct contact with some very vital interests of our Island Province. He will have charge of the winter service between the Island and the mainland for one thing, and we all know how important it is to have this in capable hands. Both he and the new Premier have expressed their strong sympathy with this Province in all matters affecting our transportation and freight rates, and we do not doubt that within reasonable time we shall realise the benefits of their sympathetic treatment of that question. Both Mr. Borden and Mr. Hazen are now pretty well known in Prince Edward Island, and we trust that they will understand our wants and requirements better than the Quebec ministers in whose hands the Marine portfolio was, so long held. As to federal matters in general Mr. Hazen seems likely to be the representative of both New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, as to a large extent Hon. Mr. Fielding has represented Nova Scotia and this Province in the past fifteen years.

Hon. Mr. Hazen is in the prime of life, and his public and private life have been irreproachable. He stands high in the legal profession, and has proved himself an excellent leader and administrator. He comes of an old New Brunswick family, and is universally regarded as a gentleman of probity and honor. As a debater he will rank among the foremost of his party in Parliament. He is not yet a member of the House, but it is understood that several seats have been offered him, including that of Dr. Daniel, M. P. for Saint John County. Dr. Daniel may be appointed to the Senate. Mr. Hazen will easily secure a seat and along with Premier Borden will add such weight to the Administration as will go far to compensate for the reduction of eastern representation in the Cabin-

#### CAN SIR WILFRID COME BACK.

The question is being asked in certain quarters, Can Sir Wilfrid Laurier come back to power as leader of the Liberal party in Canada? To many of the "Plumed Knights" followers and admirers the question will seem an absurd one. They will say, Of course he can come back and will come back and that before long, stronger than ever, to carry forward to completion the great career and great works he has begun. Such persons will point to the great success which he has achieved, to his long term of power, to his eminence as a Canadian and Imperial statesman, to the honors showered upon him at home and abroad, to his marvellous

tact, his abounding courtesy, his great gift of oratory, his blameless life, his brilliant qualities of mind and heart and the love and admiration which he has aroused among millions of the people throughout Canada.

All this and more may be admitted, and yet there are some serious difficulties in the way of Sir Wilfrid regaining the Premiership he has now laid down. The Guardian has no sympathy with the prejudice that would prevent any man of ability and character from being placed at the head of Canadian affairs, be his race or creed whatever they may be. But it would be useless to deny (more's the pity!) that such a prejudice exists, and that it was to some extent a factor in the late election.

fact, his abounding courtesy, his great gift of oratory, his blameless life, his brilliant qualities of mind and heart and the love and admiration which he has aroused among millions of the people throughout Canada.

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A feeling had grown up in the English-speaking Provinces that under a French Premier Quebec had somehow an undue control in the affairs of the Dominion. Perhaps this feeling was most potent in Ontario, but it existed also to some extent in the Maritime Provinces and Manitoba. The rivalry between Ontario and Quebec had existed for seventy years, and it will not down in a day. This fact is against Sir Wilfrid's return to the Premiership, he is a Quebec man and the people of the other Provinces feel that fifteen years is long enough to have "Quebec in the saddle."

These things are against Sir Wilfrid's early return to power—some prejudice against Quebec holding the premier place in Dominion affairs, and this not altogether unmixed with some feeling that it is desirable to have a leader whose race and creed are in closer accord with those of the majority in Canada. However regrettable this all may be, it militates against Sir Wilfrid's early return to power, and time is somewhat against his return at a later date. Sir Wilfrid, although still a wonderfully alert and vigorous man for his years, is regrettably no longer young. Should Mr. Borden's term in office be prolonged beyond five years to come, Sir Wilfrid will then be an old man, and more desirous even than now to seek repose and entrust the affairs of state to younger hands. He will in the near future make an admirable leader of the Opposition, but it may be doubted if he will care to continue in that place longer than until a suitable successor is in sight. Perhaps some Imperial appointment with new honors may be found for him in some other part of the great Empire in which he has been for years past so conspicuous a figure.

#### SIR MAX DENIES

MONTREAL, Oct. 17.—Sir William Max Aitken, M. P., is in the city. There have been rumors that Aitken intends to give up politics in England and enter politics in Canada. Questioned regarding rumors, he said "It is absurd. I have no intention of doing anything of the kind."

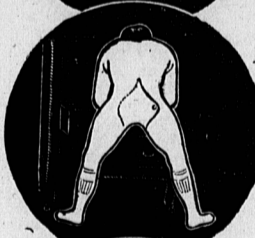
