No man knows what is going on in Russia or what will be the immediate outcome. The Czar does not know; Premier Witte does not know; the Russian people do not know, much less can the outside world know. The Russian territory is so vast, the people so many, of various races, speech and customs, the standard of intelligence and education among the masses so low, and withal the means of communication so uncertain and interrupted, that the outer world can only learn by degrees what is going on.

What seems apparent is that Russia is a vast sea of troubled waters, swept by a cyclone of tremendous violence, in which the ship of state, sadly battered by wind and wave, and with a new and untried crew, is laboring heavily, almost hopelessly. The nations from many shores are spectators of the struggle, greatly concerned, but powerless to help. For Russia, like many another, must work out her own salvation.

The glimpses we get, fitful and partial as they are, show a many-sided struggle—strikes in the Government workshops; strikes in all the great factories, railways, telegraphs; street riots in various great cities; exhibitions of race hatred against the Jews, who are plundered and killed; revolutionary uprisings against civil, provincial and national governments; cries of anarchy and revolution in vast public gatherings, mingled with rejoicings for promised freedom, and beneath it all a general distrust, the pinch of famine and the rigor of the on-coming winter.

These conditions have enabled Witte to force the Emperor to promise much though as yet little has been realized—little of all that is needed, and get something. The Procurator of the Holy Synod, an ecclesiastical and civil tyrant, has been forced to resign; Finland has her constitution and Parliament restored. But the masses have no leader to direct them, no Moses to lead them out of the wilderness. It is strange that no such man has appeared in this tremendous crisis. And the Russian people do not know what they want, beyond land to till and an easing of their tax burdens and their bondage. Who can guess what the coming months will bring about in Russia?

Railway accidents are mounting up again. For the three months ending with June in the United States, 262 passengers were killed and 2,704 injured. Accidents of other kinds including those sustained by employees at work, and by passengers getting on and off the cars, etc., bring the total of railway casualties for three months up to the appalling figures of 14,000, in which 886 were killed and 13,783 injured.

Submarine war craft have as yet accomplished little or nothing, but the naval powers are rapidly adding them to their fleets. France, with 37, is building 32 more, and Britain with 17 has 23 more under construction or ordered. The size of submarines is also being increased by Britain from 120 to 300 tons, and the horse-power from 150 to 850, with proportional increase of speed and radius of operation.

The Patriot now ventures the opinion that "time will prove the wisdom of having centered the buildings and out-door works of the railway in a compact form," and that all will be so arranged as to give complete satisfaction to those who were opposed to the site now chosen. The Patriot apparently does not know what leading and influential members of its own party are saying on the subject. If it did the deep feeling of resentment and indignation which the location has excited would not be slurred over so lightly. The site does not admit of a reasoned defence. It is a matter that from the Liberal standpoint had better be given over to silence.

INSURANCE PROSECUTIONS. We shall soon know whether District Attorney Jerome shall be re-elected in New York, where the elections take place tomorrow. The entire continent is more or less interested in this matter owing to the high character of the man and his resolute and energetic efforts for the suppression and punishment of vice and crime. During his past term he undoubtedly acted in accordance with a high standard of public duty, showing neither fear nor favor in dealing with public wrongdoing.

He is being opposed strongly by the criminal classes and those who sympathize with them, and by strong corporate influences that he has antagonized. Among these are the big insurance officials, whose prosecution he has openly threatened and who will do everything in their power to defeat him. His election in face of the opposition presented on every side but that of honesty and good citizenship would afford a rare and remarkable instance of the triumph of a strong and upright official against what would seem to be overwhelming odds. Here is what Mr. Jerome has to say in part in regard to the grafting insurance men:

"If re-elected District Attorney for this county," he says, "I shall go to the board of estimate and apportionment and ask a special appropriation which will enable me to retain Charles E. Hughes as special counsel. I will then turn over the ordinary routine of my office to my chief of staff, and I will devote all my own time and that of as many assistants as may be necessary, to assisting Mr. Hughes in prosecuting each and every person in connection with the insurance scandals who may have done anything to bring them within the reach of the criminal law."
