PTE. LIVINGSTON DEAD.—Mrs. Duncan Livingstone of this city received notice from Ottawa yesterday informing her that her son, No. 71217, Private Gordon Livingstone of the 26th Overseas Battalion, Canadian Expeditionary Force, who was officially reported missing August 15th, 1917, has now been found for official purposes, presumed to have died on or since the above date. Private Livingstone, who went over with the old 106th, was a young man of great promise and his death is a severe shock to his parents, who had hoped that the suspense of the past year might end otherwise.

HORSE NOTE.—Unless a well known horseman here changes his mind, one of the fastest horses in the Province is likely to come this way, providing a sale can be effected says the North Sydney Herald. The new comer is the recent importation of Hammond Kelly, of Southport, P. E. I., named Colorado L 219, which last week defeated in straight heats Lillian Patchen and Derby, at Charlottetown, in the fast time of 1.07, 1.04 and 1.03, pretty fast ice going. However, much depends on the outcome of the race on the Charlottetown ice this week between Colorado L, Angus Dillard, Diogola and King Olka, four of the fastest ice horses perhaps in the Dominion. Should the Kelly horse win it might militate against his coming here, for the reason that the price might go up a bit, providing, of course Mr. Kelly has the horse in the market.

CHILDREN'S AID MEETING.—At a special meeting of the Board of Management of the Children's Aid Society, held Monday afternoon, the Vice-President, Rev. Dr. Fullerton, who occupied the chair, referred to the great loss sustained by the whole community of this City and Province, and the particularly heavy loss of the Society, resulting from the death of Dr. Conroy. He suggested the passage of a resolution expressive of the deep sympathy of the Society with Mrs. Conroy and her sons, and also the election of a member of the Board of Management to be President in his stead. It was, then, on motion of the Rev. Mr. Fulton, seconded by Mr. W. L. Cotton, resolved that Mr. Alexander McDonald, of the P. E. Island Railway, be president of the Society throughout the remainder of the current term of office. Mr. McDonald took the chair, and it was resolved that Rev. Dr. Fullerton, Dr. McMillan, and Mr. W. L. Cotton be a committee to prepare and transmit to Mrs. Conroy and her sons a message expressive of the sympathy of the Board in the great loss they have sustained.

Spain Ruffles up her Feathers

Spain Gets Restive

News is to be the effect that the Spanish Cabinet which was suspected of pro-German sympathies, has fallen, and not fallen, we may be sure, because the breed of bulls that they fight in Spain is deteriorating, nor any other personal reason. Spain is answering to the influences of the war. The Cabinet that has just gone out is suspected of having been a pro-German Cabinet. If this is true, the Cabinet that succeeds will be a pro-ally Cabinet. Spain has had both kinds since the war began. Spain has suffered from the depredations of German submarines; she has benefited by allied shipping. She has been the victim of German intrigue to an extent unparalleled except by the case of Italy. In Spain there are thousands of German houses which have been veritable outposts of the Berlin Foreign Office, business men who transacted business at a loss for the purpose of establishing themselves as influences in Spain, the German Government paying their losses and giving them salaries.

How She Has Helped Germany

In Spain there have been bases used by German submarines. In Spain there is a wireless tower that sends messages to Germany. For a neutral to communicate with a belligerent is quite according to the rules of warfare, but it is not according to these rules that enemies should make use of the means of communication to give military intelligence. This has happened in Spain, as we know, but the Spanish Government has not been held responsible. So with the submarine bases—they were not sanctioned by the Spanish Government, any more than the submarine bases in parts of Ireland were sanctioned by the British Government. On the whole Spain has wanted to be neutral. Certain classes have been pro-German and are pro-ally. The Government has sought to be impartial. It happens, however, that the allies have been in a position to put the screws on Spain, and this position in which the allies find themselves may be responsible for the present Cabinet crisis.

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BLIND BELIEF

Swedish Consul Gustavus Swan said, in discussing the war: "The exposures from Buenos Aires show that Germany believes all's fair in love and war. I would, therefore, suggest that in the next edition of this poem the erroneous calculation to which I refer should be corrected as follows: "Every moment dies a man and one and a sixteenth is born." I may add that the exact figures are 1,167, but something must, of course, be conceded to the laws of rhythm."
