PROVIDING the roads are in travelling condition, Rev. W. B. Thomas will preach in the Vernon River south Methodist church next Sabbath at 11 a. m. and Vernon River north at 2.30 p. m.

ONE of the sights at Campbellton on Wednesday last was the presence of a large moose roaming through the streets of the town. The monarch of the New Brunswick forests took advantage of the close season to pay a visit to the town to see if there were any more signs of spring than in his winter quarters.

A CONVENTION of Farmers' Institute delegates will be held in the B. I. S. hall on the afternoon and evening of April 17th. There will be one representative for every twenty paid up members. Papers on matters of provincial interest will be read by prominent agriculturists. E. W. Hodson, Dominion Live Stock Commissioner or his representative is expected to be present.

The employees of the Charlottetown Condensed Milk Factory on Monday night presented the late Superintendent G. B. Pippy with a handsome ring and an appreciative address on the occasion of his resignation and departure for Nova Scotia. Mr Pippy replied briefly thanking the donors for their kind remembrance and expressing his regret at the severance of his relations with those among whom he had worked.

The Brotherhood of Railway Conductors will hold their annual convention at Portland, Oregon, this year. The convention will open on the 10th of May. A number of Intercolonial Railway conductors from the different divisions are arranging to attend as delegates. Great preparations are being made to make it the greatest annual O. R. C. convention ever held. Conductors who are married will be accompanied by their wives. It is not probable that any from the P. E. Island Railway will be in attendance.

PERSONS who are contemplating a trip to the World's Fair in Portland, Oregon, this year, will regret to learn that the fares to that place will not be as low as they were for excursions to the west last year. The rates were decided upon at a meeting of passenger agents held in the west a short time ago. The rate from Chicago to Portland and return has been made \$26.50. Last year the excursion rate was \$20. From western points to Chicago, instead of one single fare, the return fare will be eighty per cent. of two single fares. Thus the single fare from St. John to Chicago is \$25.50, and the return rate for the trip to the fair will be \$22.40. This added to the \$56.50 from Chicago will make the total for the return from St. John not less than \$98.90. Parties who wish to go to Portland via Vancouver or through California will be called upon to pay \$11 extra.

CHARLES TURNER departed this life suddenly on March 16th, at the ripe age of eighty one. He was one of the pioneer settlers at Upton and was a prosperous and much respected member of the community. For about twenty years he was unable to work, but well enough to walk about and look after the many interests that were important to him. Of late years his property has become widely popular as excellent fishing grounds. Mr. Turner was of a mild and kindly disposition and the special favorite of his grandchildren. For many years he was a member of the Methodist Church and his Christian influence was much felt both within and without his home. Three sons, Robert and Adolphus on the homestead and William on an adjoining farm, and three daughters, Mrs. Steele, Mrs. Robertson and Mrs. Down are left to mourn the loss of an affectionate father. The funeral was largely attended and interment made in Dundee cemetery. Rev. W. Wass conducted the services both at the house and grave.

The question of selling the First Baptist Church, Montreal, of which Rev. J. A. Gordon, late of this city is pastor, to a syndicate has been discussed for some time. The church is situated in a section of the city which is fast growing into the business centre and the site should command a big price. If sold, the congregation will erect a larger church in another site.

SERGEANT INSTRUCTOR HESSIAN came to the city yesterday from Georgetown and will remain here till the line to Tignish is opened up. While he remains in the city he will enlist men for the Garrison at Quebec. He is well satisfied with the standard of the men who apply to him. He will remain in the city only a few days longer when he will leave for other towns in this province. Any young men in this city who intend joining the Artillery should see him as soon as possible. While he is out of the city anyone desiring to join the Artillery, Quebec, may apply to him in writing when he will make all the necessary arrangements for their transportation. The young men of this city who have been in Quebec undergoing a course of military instruction have returned home and it is reported many men are arriving in Quebec daily from P. E. I., N. S. and N. B. If you intend joining now is the time. As soon as the equipment of men required arrive at Quebec, Sgt. Instructor Hessian and all other men performing this duty will be recalled. Get your application in early so Sgt. Instructor Hessian will send you on before the Garrison is filled up. Several young men applied yesterday and they will likely be sent to Quebec tomorrow night. Sgt. Instructor Hessian is staying at Miss MacMillan's, Prince Street.

There are still some 250 cars at Pictou loaded with freight for Prince Edward Island. It will be remembered that these cars accumulated at Pictou in consequence of the blockade of the Northumberland Straits with ice, rendering it impossible for the steamer to make the usual transfer from Pictou to Georgetown, P. E. I. There is a question as to the wisdom of the Intercolonial Railway officials in permitting such a large number of cars, many of them belonging to other roads, to be loaded and accepted for points which were impossible to reach. In a somewhat similar situation to that presented on the Intercolonial, it may be recalled, that the Grand Trunk Railway during the winter of 1903-1904, placed an embargo on all freight for certain points, owing to the fact that severe storms had blocked their lines. Even had this traffic been accepted the same conditions would exist as at present on the I. C. R., namely, impossibility to deliver freight at destination. As a result of the I. C. R.'s action in accepting these cars the railway is paying heavy demurrage charges to foreign roads as car rental. This may be readily estimated as the ruling per diem charges per car are 20 cents per day up to 20 days and thereafter \$1.00 per day per car. It has, therefore, already cost the railway thousands of dollars; in individual cases, sums have been paid out for using the cars as warehouses, in excess of the freight charges on the contents. This might have been avoided had some discrimination been shown and with no loss nor any further advantage to consignees and consignors—Moncton Transcript.

DUNSMUIR AND VICINITY—During the past week the snow banks have gotten about one-half, and those who own orchards have been kept busy shovelling the snow from around the trees, in order to keep the branches from being broken off. Owing to the soft weather traveling, except on foot, has been out of the question although on Wednesday the mail carrier succeeded in making his way from Charlton to Dundas. But he had to give up trying to get to Annandale; in fact it is hard to tell how a horse could travel at all. Despite the rapidity with which the snow is melting there has not been much trouble with freshets as there is no frost in the ground and the water soaks away very fast. According to the oldest inhabitant we are going to have an early spring, the reasons given being that the swamp willow, poplar, and other early budding trees are now advanced to a condition of leaf forming, only reached after all danger of hard frost is past. The writer saw several days ago wild geese, swamp ptarmigan or black birds, blue birds, gray birds and robins, in large numbers, all of which seemed by their actions to think that spring was here. Nothing of much importance is doing just at present. Everyone seems to be waiting for the snow to take its departure. James Dunsmuir left on Thursday for the Northwest. Should the manufacture of peat for fuel be commenced in this province there is plenty of it in a large bog between Forest Hill and Mount Hope there being over one hundred acres of it and from ten to thirty feet in depth, and it has been pronounced of good quality by those who have handled it.
