ALIENS IN CANADA MUST JOIN UP

OTTAWA, Oct. 4.—The alien problem in Canada as far as Greece, Italy and Belgium is concerned has been solved. The government has been officially notified that these three countries have agreed to sign "glaciers" treaties with Canada similar to the one in effect with the United States which provides for a reciprocal conscription of men for military service. This means that all Greeks, Italians and Belgians of military age in Canada will either have to enlist in the armies of their own countries within a stated period or else get drafted into the Canadian army. It is estimated that there are at least 25,000 to 30,000 Italians and Greeks of military age chiefly in the large centres of eastern Canada.

a stirring appeal on behalf of the people there.

Rev. A. F. Robb, home from Korea, brought back encouraging reports from that field.

After a generation there is a regularly organized self-governing, self-supporting church, with 70,000 communicants, 80,000 catechumens and adherents. There are 500 primary schools for schemes of the church. \$104,000 was given last year, equal to contributions in Canada, taking the wage scale into consideration, of over a million dollars. Mr. Robb dwelt on the influence of the Korean church in Siberia, Man-

churia and Shantung, and the need of strengthening the evangelistic and educational work in Korea, Vladivostok, Eastern Siberia and other contiguous territory. He further said, "After 17 years in the Orient I fear that unless every Asiatic nation is Christianized, a greater war than the present will follow, a war between the heathen and the so-called Christian nations of the west. He exhibited a photo of 30 young Koreans in training for the Christian ministry at Peing Yang.

Rev. D. J. Cook, missionary home on furlough from Central India, brought a message from that field. There is ample room for a forward movement there with one section containing 30 millions without a mission-ary.

The fact that India is about to receive a measure of Home Rule patterned after Canada and her population is 3-4 that of the British Empire, must be considered when missionary extension is planned.

Rev. R. W. Ross reported for the Synod committee on the Forward Movement, presenting the program to be followed including the eight days special meetings.

The report was adopted. The postponed discussion on the Sunday School report was resumed by Rev. D. M. Matheson of Stellarton, Rev. A. McLeod of Glace Bay and Rev. J. W. A. Nicholson of Dartmouth. The last named disagreed with Mr. Grants argument, but supported his
