IN THIS CORNER

Promoters of the Maritime Amateur Boxing Championships and the two thrilling events staged in connection with them will be proud of their efforts in giving to Island sport fans the two days that have just been experienced. It has been a long while since events of this nature, so much work and time have been conducted in such an efficient manner and provided such stirring competition.

There wasn't a dull moment during the two nights of boxing. Each and every competitor gave everything they had and fans were well repaid for their attendance. There is little need to comment further. D. W. Fraser, President of the Maritime Boxing Association summed it up briefly when he stated "that it was the finest amateur tournament he had ever seen staged east of Montreal."

Mr. Fraser has watched a lot of these tournaments and the above coming from him is certainly lavish but justified praise. No expense was spared and although those promoting the affairs took a whole of a hecking from a financial standpoint it didn't deter them one bit from giving those interested enough to attend the best possible show.

It is a funny thing, but when an event of this importance is staged here it usually winds up in the "red". The reason is hard to understand. When the same events are being staged in another province the usual query is "why don't they get them here?" There is a lot of interest evidenced then. The event does come here and suddenly as if some one threw ice water on the whole thing, interest cools and the windup of it all is the promoters digging away down deep for expenses. It has happened before and it certainly happened at this year's boxing championships.

Just how long the promoters will continue to take their "lickings" is a matter for the promoters themselves to decide but it certainly looks as if practically all sport is a dead issue on the Island and it seems hopeless to expect attendances to justify expenses that are paid out.

Junior Canadians meet an all-star aggregation from Summerside tonight at the Park diamond in an exhibition encounter. Victors in the first clash at Summerside three weeks ago the local ball-players are anxious to make it two straight over the westerners by tonight they will face a greatly strengthened team, a squad that has been hand-picked for the main purpose of lifting the Island Junior crown.

Two old and bitter rivals meet tonight in a softball encounter when 1st Medium Brigade clash with the Exquires. Any time these two teams meet fans can expect anything at all to happen. Artillery hold a 3-1 edge in games between the pair this season and you can bet your bottom dollar that they will have their strongest lineup on hand tonight in an effort to cut that margin.

Cubs and All-Stars provided a closely contested battle in their second game of the Industrial League semi-final playoffs staged last night. Although the game failed to provide brilliant baseball by any means, nevertheless there was enough suspense connected with the outcome to keep the fans interested right to the last out.

Speaking of Tommy Farr, the new British Isles sensation, and promoter Mike Jacobs, Bob O'Meara states "Mike Jacobs sounds off the most engaging note yet heard in heavyweight circles. He never expected to find a Briton so tough as Farr."

"Michael spoke like a true New Yorker, whose beaten path is Jacobs Beach along Broadway. Or like a man who thinks because New York and Chicago can produce a specimen of gangster and tough that claims the last word in recklessness that America has a monopoly on recklessness and durability."

"It would be enlightening for Mike to try a test of toughness in such spots as Liverpool, Birmingham and other centres where you can find some of the hardest knock 'em down and drag 'em out wrappars extant. He would be surprised at the results."

"Farr did a lot of sounding off on his arrival which will cause some grave concern in England, but will be received with shrill cries of delight in New York, where fighters always like to have the acoustics perfectly arranged before telling their public what to expect."

"Farr belittled Louis plenty, which is the right note for him except at that from a box office standpoint. It was only recently that Trevor Wignall, the great 'I Am' of the London Express stated that he had been entirely responsible for getting Farr a shot at the title in the States. The waiting Welshman seems to be the kind of fellow who knows how to make his presence known, and if he had Wiggy as a tutor, the pupil seems to be outdoing the master."

P. by Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, July 22—Just how powerful may be the massed invasion from the United States converging next week on the Ottawa Hunt Club was somewhat of a mystery today but the capital's golfing experts conceded that Freddie Haas of New Orleans will be right up front gunning for the Canadian amateur title—his second.

It was only last summer that the young Louisianan, now only 21, bobbed up in Winnipeg and lifted the crown from the head of C. Ross (Sandy) Somerville of London, Ont. Somerville, who has held the title five times, moved steadily along toward his sixth championship until he reached the semi-final round and Mr. Haas. The outlander won 3 and 2, and went on to polish off Bobby Reith, of Winnipeg, 8 and 7 in the final. Sandy and Bobby will try it all over again starting next Tuesday but they, and Haas, will have a field of perhaps 125 to wade through.

Determined that the title won't go across the border this time, and that it's not another Somerville year, the top heavy Canadian portion of the field will do considerable throat-cutting before a week of match play decides the winner. Young Bobby Reith will be no setup. He has already gathered in the Manitoba title for 1937 to mark his fifth crowning. He did it with an 11 and 10 defeat of Alex Weir in the final. All but one province will have strong teams in the Willingdon Cup competition Monday, and after that all the playing will have their fling at the amateur title. Pete Kelly, who takes his turn on the ice in winter for Detroit Red Wings, will head the Maritime representatives, leading the New Brunswick Prince Edward Island team. Kelly won the 1937 two-province title. Nova Scotia will not have an entry in the team competition.

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Other Major League Pilots To Get Gate?

(By Paul Mickelson, Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, July 22—When St. Louis Browns' fired Rajah Hornsby by they touched off the opening shot of a front-office barrage that promises to blow one-third of the major league managers from their signal posts before they get a chance to predict another great pennant fight in the spring-time.

All indications point to the heaviest toll of big league pilots since the panicky period of 1932 to '35 when 12 of 16 managers passed out of the picture, most of them victims of the black ban ball. Here's how they line up:

AMERICAN LEAGUE
New York—Joe McCarthy is sticking. It's hard to find a manager who can do better than two world championships in five years with another coming up—maybe. Philadelphia—Connie Mack will stay unless he wants to fire himself.
Boston—There have been rumors Joe Cronin would lose his job.
Washington—Bucky Harris might get the job any time.
Chicago—Jimmy Dykes looks safe.
Cleveland—The wolves are howling loud. Steve O'Neill will be lucky to stick.
Detroit—Mickey Cochrane may surrender for a front office job because of his almost fatal injury.
St. Louis—The Rajah already has been fired. Jim Bottomley has become "number 260." That many managerial changes have been made since the majors opened for business.

Chicago—Illness may force Charlie Grimm into a front office job in favor of Gabby Hartnett or Billy Herman.
New York—Bill Terry is itching to get out of uniform and into the counting room where he can keep his eyes on baseball and his oil job.

St. Louis—The expected house cleaning of the Cashouers may sweep Frankie Frisch out of Pittsburgh—it looks bad for Pie Traynor.
Boston—A big, fat raise in pay is coming to Bill McKechnie.
Brooklyn—Burlie Grimes certainly deserves another year but the betting is even money he'll get the bounce.
Cincinnati—The outlook is dark for Charlie Dresen, a tough line guy, who may be fired right into Terry's job as Giant boss.
Philadelphia—The Phillies need ball players and a new ball park but Jimmy Wilson, who made a hairbreadth escape last year, may be the goat.

Berger Hits Homer In Ninth To Defeat Reds 6-5; Cubs Lose To Phils

NEW YORK, July 22—(AP)—Wally Berger came through again today when the chips were down. He hit a homer with one up in the ninth inning to break up a ball game and give the Giants a 6-5 victory over Cincinnati Reds here.

His 12th homer of the season, wound up the proceedings that were sent into a deadlock when Ival Goodman belted a four-bagger with a mate on base in the seventh to tie the count. Each team used three pitchers.

In Philadelphia, the Phillies punctured Clyde Shoun's tight pitching in the eighth inning with a seven-run barrage that carried Chicago to defeat, 7-4, and dashed the Cubs' hopes of strengthening their National League lead. Two bases on balls and hits by Norris and Martin produced two runs and started a rally that Larry French, who replaced Shoun at that point, could not check. Three more walks, a hit by Scharfen and an error brought the other runs.

St. Louis Browns surprised their supporters by outclubbing New York Yankees for a 13-4 victory, ending the Yanks six-game winning streak. The teams connected for 22 hits, 15 going to the Browns.

Yanks big hitters, Joe Dimaggio and Lou Gehrig both failed to click when they came to bat with bases loaded. While Dimaggio went hitless for the day, ending his consecutive-game hitting streak at 22, Gehrig connected for his 16th homer of the season.

He is very proud of the fact that he can still put up a good race, "going on 50". DeMar makes his living teaching the printers' trade and farming.

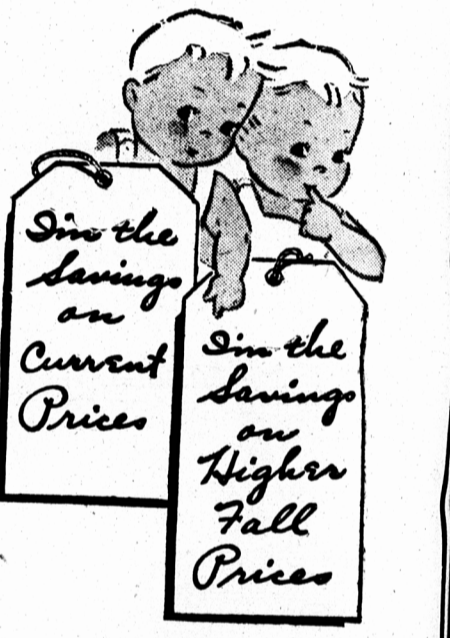
Big Chicago Golf Tourney Opens Today
