MINCEMEAT PUDDING

3 cupfuls of soft bread crumbs
1 cupful of cold water.
3/4 cupful of milk.
1/2 cupful of sugar.
1 cupful of mincemeat.
2 medium apples diced.

Cover the bread crumbs with the water and milk and let stand while measuring out the other ingredients. Add the sugar, mincemeat and apples, pared and corad before dicing, and mix well.

Place in a buttered baking dish and bake until the apples are done, about 45 minutes at a temperature of 350 degrees F. Then serve hot with whipped cream, hard sauce or lemon sauce.
