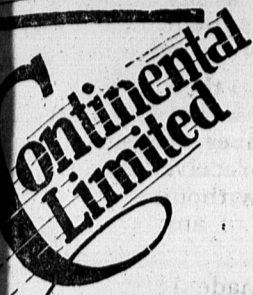

**Feed, Seed and Fertilizer Markets**

OTTAWA, Oct. 25.—Trade in seed, feed, and fertilizer throughout the rural districts is comparatively quiet at this season of the year. The farmers are principally interested in harvesting root crops, potatoes, corn and other late crops. Also fall ploughing and threshing are of vital interest. These days the chief activity in seeds is confined to flsike, alfalfa, and sweet clover in Ontario, and oats and other cereals eligible for registration throughout Eastern Canada generally. The growers are now preparing these seed products for the market. Some alsike, alfalfa, and sweet clover has already been threshed and marketed in Ontario, but the major portion of these crops is yet to be gotten ready for the market, and this will largely be postponed now until after the freeze-up.

Feed is being bought in relatively small quantities, owing to the prevalent advance in prices, and the fact that most farms are now

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stocked with a bountiful supply of home-grown grain. Movement of hay from the farms is also very small just now, owing to the pressure of other necessary fall work. Among the fertilizers, basic slag is being applied by farmers in Quebec and the Maritime Provinces in larger quantity than for a number of years. The slag used is principally the imported Bessemer slag from Belgium. Some 6,000 tons were imported for the fall trade in the province of Quebec alone this year, and is costing the farmers about \$1 per unit of total phosphoric acid, i. e. b. Montreal and Quebec.
