

Summer School of Science

The interest in the Summer School of Science grows with each day's work. Worked hard though the members are from 8.30 o'clock a. m. to after 10 o'clock, p. m. still the classes are largely attended, instructors enthusiastic, and work progresses most favorably.

On Monday evening, July 29th, a very interesting Question Box on the subject of Astronomy formed the program. Principal Cameron of Yarmouth answering the questions handed to him from the audience. Many of the difficulties in locating and determining stars were clearly explained and many members of the school will be able to more intelligently read the Heavens than they could before.

Tuesday the 30th, saw the school start on the first all-day excursion of the season. By train to Mahone, thence, by boat to Chester, a great summer resort for American tourists. No sooner had Chester been reached than lo, down came the rain in torrents, but so buoyant a spirit is the average Summer School scientist that even the rain could not dampen its fervor but rather send it seeking enjoyment in other directions. Congregating anywhere, where a shelter could be found, the time passed pleasantly away.

Wednesday evening the 31st ult was a free night for the school. The 75th Regiment Band of Lunenburg having a grand concert advertised for that night, the school postponed their own meeting to attend the concert and enjoy the treat of good music. Every one in Lunenburg is musical, and at the same time aid a local enterprise.

Among the classes having a large attendance is the one in Education, conducted by J. B. Hall, Ph. D. of Truro Normal School. Dr. Hall has just returned from a year's study and travel in Europe, having spent a large part of the time in Scotland. To his national enthusiasm in his subject is added the inspiration that came from this year's association with some of the foremost educators in the world; it is not thought that he has stirred up considerable enthusiasm a his class.

Commencing with an account of the work of Pestalozzi and pointing out the lessons left by that great educator to us his successors, the course passed on to a consideration of Herber's place in modern education. After a consideration of the historical aspect was concluded, the course of study and time table was taken up. The outcry against an overloaded course was noticed, and the fact emphasized that every subject upon the average course of study demanded recognition by the student of the time and there were other subjects that must be admitted as one complex civilization advances. How then is the difficulty to be met? Not by the elimination of subjects but by the correlation of studies, by the teaching them all as one vast subject comprising the whole, letting one subject lead naturally to another, giving it life and interest. The much discussed subject of examinations and the cognate one of cramming were next discussed. Examinations as usually conducted are temptations to much of the cramming that is so justly condemned. The cure is not in abolition of examinations but in the improvement. Examinations that test the candidate's power to think and do, rather than the ordinary one which tests how much information or book stuff the candidate has crammed, would do much to correct that most baneful of all educational evils—cramming.

Teachers following fully the course of education given in the Summer School must be the better teachers for it. On Thursday a most enjoyable excursion was had to Deep Cove. Very many points of interest were visited and very fine photographic views obtained. This excursion was the gift of the town to the school. Where we were known we are appreciated, where we are appreciated we see the right royal entertainment.

Friday evening's lecture by Prof. Prince of Ottawa was a third description of the Canadian fisheries, illustrated with stereoscopic views. On Saturday the 31st ult, the course continued with a lecture on the life of the fish, the habits of the various species, and the methods of propagation of the fish and urged upon his hearers the importance of aiding the government in every way possible by observing the regulations adopted and by the creation of a healthy public sentiment in favor of fishery protection.

Saturday evening Rev. Jas. W. Falconer of Truro lectured, taking for his subject Travels in the East. In graphic terms he described Egypt, Greece and Palestine. Egypt was the country of the materialism taught in the industrial arts. From Greece was learned the lessons of intellectuality and general culture, while from Palestine came the moral teaching that has dominated and is still more and more dominating the civilized world. This scholarly and cultured lecturer delighted the large and intelligent audience assembled to listen to him.

Passing from the evening meetings to the practical work in the class-room, there is no more interesting room to pass an hour in than the Physics room. Dr. Scott of the University of New Brunswick conducts this class, a teacher born, improved by education and training, no wonder that Dr. Scott holds the undivided attention of the very large class which daily assemble in his room. I had the privilege of listening to the lesson on heat, dealing principally with measurements of the same and more definitely with the history and philosophy of the thermometer. The means of illustration adopted were so simple that any intelligent teacher leaving that class would be able to interest and instruct their pupils on this important subject which has so great an influence on their comfort and health.
