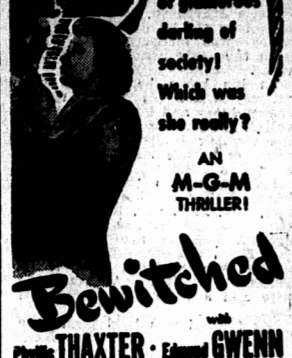

"Britain needs credit and she needs it now," the President said in a message. "The United States has a moral obligation to help her meet this need."
