The Money Maker

By W. H. Gocher The \$10,000 events at Avon and Windsor were won by Guy Reaper, Prince Charming, Bert Abbe, Silver Weather and Billy D. Two of them were placed to the credit of Bert Abbe. Silver Weather also looked as if he would make a double until the tire came off his sulky in the second heat of his race at Windsor.

Carolyne Logan was Bert Abbe's most formidable rival. Prior to these meetings the California bred mare was considered the best on account of her showing at Sturbridge where she won in 2:06 1/2. On the other hand at Greenfield and Sturbridge Bert Abbe was schooled for a bid where the purses were worth while and the speculation apt to give a better return for the effort.

Bert Abbe delivered at Norwich, Avon and Windsor. At Sage Park the margin was very narrow. Carolyne Logan won the first heat in 2:07 1/2. On the second trip Bert Abbe had so much of a bulge on her when the world was given he grabbed the pole on the first turn it looked as if the starter decided the race instead of the horses.

At Avon and Windsor Bert Abbe won \$8,230. This amount with what he won at the other circuit meetings dropped him into the 2:06 class where he will have an opportunity to meet such material as Grattan, Guesswork and Silver Weather as soon as he completes the engagements made for him last spring. Bert Abbe is a Georgia product. Gus Coggins of Canton, Ga., who owned his sire, sent him in 1925 when he was a three year old to Roy Miller at Lexington, Ky., after he worked a mile in 2:36 over a half-mile track.

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Bert Abbe is now a five year old horse. The Abbe which in addition to being a brother to The Abbott 2:03 1/4 a world's champion, also sired that splendid race horse Abbedale 2:01 1/4. His dam Miss Ella H. had a record of 2:12 1/4. She was sired by Mack H. a son of the amateur wagon trotter John A. McKerron out of Nelly Patch by Dan Patch, another champion which made a record of 1:55 1/4 behind a pacemaker.

Will Jackson put the finishing touches on Bert Abbe's training over Charter Oak Park. He also drove him in all of his races until a loss at Cherry Park put him in the hospital. Crozier substituted for him at Windsor. When the pair get together again they are apt to move near the top of the money makers on the half-mile tracks in 1927.

Since 1925 Silver Weather has been a familiar figure on the New York tracks in 1927. That fall he was sent with his sire Silverworthy to the New York sale. William Quis of Winfield, N. Y. purchased him for \$65. When he was old enough \$45 Cornwall took the pony in hand and him his preliminary work over the Mineola track.

In 1921 Silver Weather toured Pennsylvania and Maryland as a free legged pacer. The next year he dropped into the Bay State Circuit at Norwich and won. This was followed by a victory in the \$5,000 event at Cherry Park. In 1926 he defeated Grattan over the same course for \$10,000 and this year nozed her out in another with Guesswork among the trailers. Silver Weather is a stout made standing under 15 hands. He is inbred, being by Silver Axworthy 2:10 whose dam Easter Lilly W. 2:06 1/4 is a sister to E. P. W., the sire of his dam Miss Weathers. This brother and sister were got by the Walkes Boy horse Oratorio out of Flaxey, the dam of Audubon Boy, 1:54 1/4, Lady Ballou, the dam of Miss Weathers, also produced Edward P. 2:04 1/4. There is a little trot and a wealth of pacing in the inheritance of Silver Weather. He has proved a worthy representative of the family.

Billy D. is a western produced. He made his debut on the eastern tracks in 1922 when F. C. Niles of Kansas City, Mo. dropped in with his stable which was at that time trained by Float Jolly of Pippen, Ind. The outfit had an off season. The best showing made by Billy D. was a win at Honesdale, Pa. in 2:16 1/4. The following year Billy D. won in 2:11 1/4 at Great Barrington, Mass. where his owner has a summer home. In 1924 he was named with the St. Roche gelding St. Louis in on of the first 10,000 events at Windsor. Billy D. did not train up to expectations. St. Louis took his place and won a heat in 2:07 1/4.

Billy D. made his next bid at Windsor in 1925. In the first heat he stepped into a mix up which was seated Breitenfeld. Billy D. was placed. With another reinsman up the forced Robert Commodore out in 2:08 1/4. During the balance of that year and in 1926 Billy D. toured the eastern tracks, repeatedly showing his ability to pace fast. His winrace of 2:06 1/4 let him in the \$10,000 at Windsor for the 2:07 class. The talent tagged him at \$30 in \$200 and he won in the first heat he was in. He was followed by a five year old, Be by Wy Dryad was lapped on Silver Weather in 2:04 1/4 out of a mare by Millerton.
