Dull Trading On Montreal Stock Market

MONTREAL, Dec. 22.—(CP)—Last-minute demand for a few favorites brightened otherwise colorless stock market dealings today. Trading slowly in early turnover, International Nickel took a sudden forward step near the finish, closing up a point at 55, while Noranda tacked on 1-2 at 78. Smelters remained stationary at 60. Construction also took a turn for the better and a point-gain appeared in Dominion Bridge at 37. Ahead small amounts each were Canada Cement and Steel of Canada. Oils did little, aside from a narrow improvement in International Petroleum at 26 1-2. Among the papers, Price Brothers and St. Lawrence Corporation sold lower. Canadian Car common and preferred selling ex-dividend, moved up a little in the rail division, as did National Steel Car. Utilities followed mixed trends, with Canadian and Shawinigan narrowly higher while Montreal Power and Power Corporation gave up fractions. Total sales: 81,100 shares; minuses, 50,000; industrials, 31,100; bonds, \$1,900.

Stock Prices Close Higher In New York

BY FREDERICK GARDNER Associated Press Financial Writer NEW YORK, Dec. 22.—(AP)—The stock market got a foothold on the upgrade today after slipping downhill for five straight sessions. More year-end liquidation in airfares and scattered other issues impeded the turnaround. However, a late blue flurry enabled the market to close on a rallying note. Rails, usually the laggards, showed more bounce on the upside than most groups. Speculation held to a leisurely pace and transactions ran at about the same rate as yesterday, totalling 1,042,920 shares against 1,057,745. The Associated Press composite price of 60 stocks advanced 3 of a point at 50.9. Canadian issues were lower. Minor losses were registered by Dominion Stores, McIntyre, Industrial Alcohol, Marconi, Lake Shore, Massey Harris and Shawinigan. International Nickel advanced 1-8 points to 54 1-2. Distillers and Walkers were steady. Additional profit-taking and a decline in a turn on the downside widened losses in the leading airfares, which did a tailspin in the previous session. They rallied for the most part toward the finish and closed mixed, with Douglas off more than a point at 76 1-2.

Snow For Poultry

(Experimental Farms News) The problem of supplying water to poultry is always a difficult one during winter months, especially for the farmer who keeps a small flock as a side-line to other larger enterprises. It can be overcome by the use of heated or thermos drinking fountains or by replenishing the supply with hot water at frequent intervals, states E. P. Goring, Assistant, Dominion Experimental Station, Kapuskasing, Ont. These methods are satisfactory but have certain disadvantages. The former requires capital outlay and upkeep, and the latter, regular if intermittent attention which often will greatly inconvenience other important work. At the Dominion Experimental Station at Kapuskasing, Ontario, it has been found, from tests conducted over a period of eight years, that the use of a certain type of in place of water with excellent results. Production of eggs is slightly decreased, but it has been calculated, outlined above, will more than offset the slight decrease. The snow is placed in a fairly large receptacle such as a good sized wash basin, on a small stand. The receptacle is not filled more than two thirds full. This helps to prevent snow from being scattered on the floor. Up to date the birds in this experiment have received a hot wet mash at noon, but the experiment is now being continued with the hot mash eliminated.

Held Up Bank With Water Vials

CHICAGO, Dec. 22.—(AP)—A blond slender woman armed only with two vials of water, robbed a bank of \$5,000 today—but ran into the sleazy arms of a negro policeman at the exit door. Police Captain Eugene Barry said the comely prisoner identified herself as Mrs. Mary Schuch, 36, signed a confession and commented: "It was all a colossal bluff." "I'm in poor health," she related. "I couldn't find work. I'm desperate. This seemed the only way to get some money." Her story of the fantastic, five-minute fluke at crime, amplified by bank officials and the Captain, was substantially this: Mrs. Schuch walked into the Drexel State Bank on the south side. She approached the President, R. J. Neal. She handed him a note ordering him to "make a draft for \$5,000 and cash it for me or I will blow up the bank with two vials of nitroglycerin. I have an accomplice at the door with a machine gun." Neal glanced up. He noticed the vials—one clutched in each of her nervous hands. He looked toward the front of the building. A car driver, entered by the woman and waiting impatiently for his fare, peered in through the plate glass window. Neal wrote the cheque. He escorted her to the desk of C. Poffenberger, Vice President. None of the two dozen customers paid any heed. Poffenberger was puzzled but he counter-signed the paper. Neal took the woman to a teller's window and gave a reassuring nod. She signed the draft with the name "Bess Carney," took the money and hurried to the door. Quickly Neal signalled to Chris Covington, the policeman stationed there. The officer grasped her and pinned her arms to her side. Detectives said she told them she sealed the contents of only water. No analysis of the contents was made during the day.

NEW YORK, Dec. 22.—(AP)—The British Pound wandered over an erratic course in terms of the United States dollar today to close at 4.66 9/16 for a loss of 5-16 cent. The French franc declined .00 1-8 cent to 2.63 5-8 while the Swiss franc was unchanged. The Belg advanced .01 cent and the guilder lost a like amount. After gaining 1-32 cent during the day, the Canadian dollar dipped to its opening figure of 15-16 per cent discount.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 22.—(CP)—An estimated export business of around 300,000 bushels was the only feature of a narrow Winnipeg wheat market today as futures prices moved fractionally higher in steady trading. The sales were said to have been over chiefly from Vancouver. Values closed 3-3-8 cent higher, with December at 59 3-4, May 61 1-2, and July 62 cents. In addition to the export sales, the market was aided by support from steady current on Winnipeg export change and commission houses who purchased offerings for eastern and southern accounts. United States markets moved much the same as Winnipeg with Chicago advancing in the early stages and slipping off slightly near the close. Buenos Aires continued to give firm display by boarding fractional advances. No improvement was noted in the demand for cash wheat and coarse grains. Spreads on various grades were unchanged and only odd lots were traded. Scattered speculative support was noticed at times in barley whose prices were up almost one cent at top levels. The price range in other grains was narrow higher.
