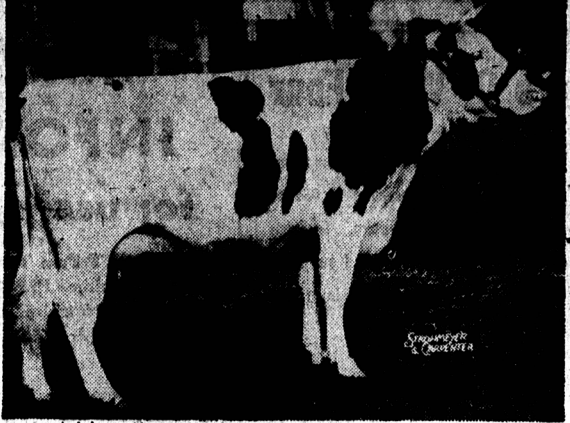

Will Seek Criminal Code Amendment In Public Interest (By The Canadian Press) TORONTO, Jan. 31 - The newspaper of Canada today asked the Dominion Government to amend the criminal code to provide that charges of conspiracy to commit libel be tried in the province where the newspaper involved is published.

The code now provides this protection to newspapers when charged with defamatory libel but not when charged with conspiracy to publish it.

The Canadian Daily Newspapers Association, through its president, H.G. Kimber of the Toronto Globe and Mail, petitioned Justice Minister Islay for the change in a letter sent to Ottawa today. The C.D.N.A. also suggested a possible amendment to the code in a resolution of its board of directors.

The resolution said that current prosecution in Alberta of Jack Kent Cooke of Toronto and Harold Dingman of Ottawa for conspiracy to publish a defamatory libel "shows that the purpose and intent of section 888 of the criminal code may be evaded" and that publishers and editors will be deprived of the protection intended to be given them "if the crown officers arbitrarily choose to resort to the device" of charging conspiracy "rather than the substantive offence of publication of a defamatory libel."

Two Children Burned To Death

LONDON, Ont., Feb. 1 - (CP) - Two little children burned to death early Saturday when their cottage home on the southern outskirts of London was destroyed by a fire that drew their mother and another child in night dress into a snow-covered field with the temperature at 17 below zero.

Dead are: Michael Patrick Donovan, six months, and Alphonso Donovan, two years, children of Gerald Donovan, a 23-year-old war veteran who formerly lived in Glace Bay, N.S.

Mrs. Donovan, formerly Mary McNeill, 22, also from Glace Bay, made a heroic effort to save her three children but could only snatch Peter Matthew, 20 months, from a room that had become an inferno in a matter of minutes.

Mrs. Donovan was taken to hospital suffering from serious burns to her face, hands and back. Her infant son escaped injury.

Labrador Village Damaged By Fire

(By Russell J. Collins, Boston Globe Correspondent Representing News Services) GOOSE BAY, Labrador, Feb. 1 - (AP) - Canadian and United States firemen flying out of this lately-operated air outpost-Saturday joined to bring relief to the 136 inhabitants of the partially-burned-out fishing settlement of Moksokvik, Labrador.

Food, clothing and medical supplies were dropped by parachute from two Douglas' transports-one an R.C.A.F. plane and the other a United States Air Transport Command ship. Other supplies were flown in by a single-engine, ski-equipped R.C.A.F. Norseman to the hamlet devastated by fire last Tuesday.

News of the fire at this village in the wastelands of Labrador in which nearly all of the community food, clothing and medical supplies were burned did not reach Goose Bay until 10 a.m. yesterday in a radio message from Cape Harrison, a United States base in Labrador. There was no loss of life.

To get word out of the isolated location a dog sled driver traveled 65 miles over rough terrain to Cape Harrison. The settlement's only short-wave radio was destroyed in the fire.
