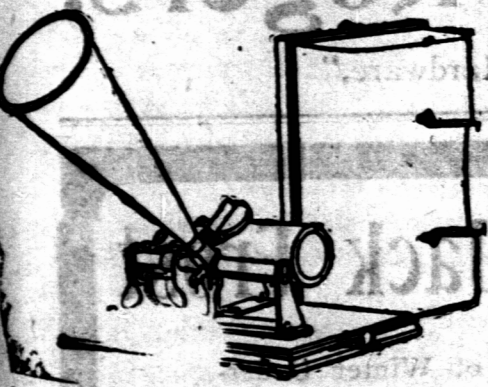

ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

The last sailing of the Plant Line steamer Halifax is next Tuesday.

The Epworth League meeting tonight promises to be very interesting. The regular service starts at 7.30 o'clock P. M. sharp and lasts until 8.15 then the debating club meet and will discuss "Woman Suffrage." Strangers made welcome at the First Methodist Church basement.

This meeting in the Young Men's Christian Association next Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock will be for men only and will be addressed by Rev. R. W. Stevenson on the subject of temperance. The 4th regiment band will be in attendance and will lead the musical part of the service. A cordial invitation is extended to all men to be present at this meeting.

The Elctra was in port yesterday from Murray River with a full cargo including 44 drums fish, 87 cases meat, 6 cases blueberries, 51 carcasses mutton, 80 bbls apples, 8 cases lobsters, 30 half bbls herrings, 19 bundles codfish and sundries. There were also two passengers Mr. Hyde, of Murray Harbor South and Alex. McLeod, Murray River to join the Stanley. She left in the afternoon with a full cargo of general merchandise.

An English woman in Canada writes to The Leader in a caustic strain upon the taste and appearance of Canadian women. She says that no English girl who lets her lover go to Canada to make a home for her need fear that he will fall a victim to the charms of Canadian girls. At Ottawa, Toronto and Montreal the typical face is hard-featured and sallow and frequently muddy complexioned, no doubt the result of overheated rooms, pastry and candy. One can seldom see the pink and white skin of the English girl. The Canadian girls have long thick hair, dressed in the "Gibson Girl" fashion. The girls are well set up and neat, but have no idea of softening their hard features by a less hard style of dress. A London shop girl would look perfectly elegant beside a Toronto or Montreal girl. In Toronto when a woman is over 30 she wears her hair dragged up behind and tight in front, surmounted by a hard looking felt hat which only serves to intensify her plainness. Royal blue or pure white, the two fall colors usually worn, last accord with the Canadian girl's complexion.

As the date of the Winter Fair draws near it is gratifying to note indications that the show this year promises to eclipse the one of a year ago, not only in value of prizes but in entries and attendance as well. Those who saw at Halifax, Charlottetown, or St. John, the case of valuable cups and silver plates donated by dozens of enterprising associations, companies and individuals must have been impressed with the fact that the value of the Winter Fair is being heartily appreciated, even outside of the agricultural circles. Accordingly it is not surprising to find the stockmen preparing for a keen competition. It is auspicious that the first entry has been received from Prince Edward Island, thus auguring well for an inter-provincial show. The only fear as to the Island contributions is the uncertainty whether communication will be maintained until the fair is over, between Summerside and Point du Chene. President E. E. Elderkin has been endeavoring to secure the presence of a winter steamer at Summerside to continue the service in case the summer boats should be unable to keep it up. It is to be hoped that he will succeed, else exhibitors from the Island province might be subjected to the expense and inconvenience of a long detour. Barring this possibility, there is nothing serious to militate against the success of the fair, and as the energetic promoters are meeting an enthusiastic response we may confidently expect the best stock show of 1903 to be a record breaker. The value of this institution can scarcely be over estimated. Its effects are widely disseminated and exercise a potent influence for good. The block waste, the lectures and in fact the whole programme entitle it to be called the most practical educator of all the fairs. Attractive to exhibitors, instructive to visitors, inspiring and educational to everyone, it deserves our enthusiastic support and we trust that everyone will do all in his power to contribute to its success.—Mar time Farmer.

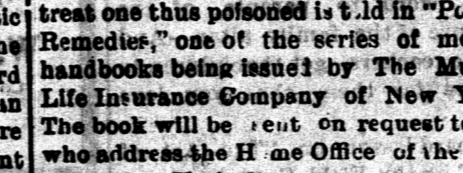
