He who entered as a little child, laid on the doorstep a new version of his relationship to God. Think deeply of the child, of his enormous potentiality for good or ill, bear upon your soul the thought that your treatment and influence is the great factor in making that child the man he ought to be. "Except ye become as little children ye shall not enter the Kingdom." Let us preserve in our hearts the infinite spirit of wonder that characterizes the little child, and trusting, loving, believing, with humility serving, we may be fit for the Kingdom of God.
