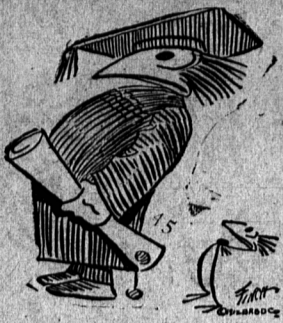

N. B. & P. E. ISLAND METHODIST CONFERENCE

CHATHAM, N. B., June 11.—At the New Brunswick and P. E. I. Methodist Conference here the first draft of the station sheet shows that Rev. J. L. Dawson of St. Stewart has been transferred to the First Church, Charlottetown, Rev. T. Marshall of Grace Church to Fredericton, Rev. Richard Ople, to Woodstock, Rev. E. A. Westmoreland from York to Grace Church, Charlottetown.

Rev. R. G. Fulton, owing to the nature of the work still to be done at Chatham, has declined to go to Charlottetown for this year.

There were 39 Ministers at the ministerial session. Rev. W. F. Gieseler of St. John, and Rev. Neil McLaughlin of Fredericton were transferred out of this Conference, the latter to Nova Scotia, and the former to Ontario. Rev. M. E. Conron was transferred from Ontario to this Conference. He is going to the Portland Church, St. John.

Rev. W. B. Thomas, Jacob Heaney and Wm. Pennie were made supernumeraries. Rev. Jacob Heaney on account of illness but will probably be able to undertake active work the beginning of next year.

O. H. Pettis, W. B. Turner, and F. H. Littlejohn are to be ordained on Sunday morning. S. R. Irving will be ordained by request of the Alberta Conference. Earle Fyche, Oromocto, and John Livingston Lunn were received on trial for the Ministry. Rev. J. K. Curtis, Assistant Secretary of the S. S. Young Peoples Societies, addressed the Conference.

men to have oversight of this great and rapidly developing industry. In no other way could the permanency of the fox-breeding business be so impressed upon the world at large, and moreover, it would tend to still further accentuate the fact that Prince Edward Island is the seat and centre of fox-breeding.

Dr. Higgins expressed his admiration of the ability and resourcefulness displayed by many of the ranchmen he had met and said it reflected credit upon the intelligence and skill of those who had been the means of conserving this valuable and fast-diminishing fur-bearing animal, and fostering and developing the industry to its present great dimensions. Premier Matheson, on behalf of the province, thanked Dr. Higgins for the valuable and suggestive report he had given; he also asked Dr. Higgins to convey his personal thanks to the Minister of Agriculture for the prompt response he had given to his request for the visit of an expert to the province. The Government, he said, had under consideration the establishment of a Department of Public Health for the province. While the Government's plans were not yet matured he would go so far as to say that he had no doubt, if the fox breeders, acting upon the suggestion of Dr. Higgins, appointed an expert pathologist, the Government would provide laboratory facilities and give all reasonable assistance in making effective the proposed new department.

The Fox Breeders' Association has now under consideration the matter of securing a thoroughly qualified pathologist and providing the means for financing the undertaking.

INTER-MARITIME RIFLE MATCH

gusty, and it was no easy task holding the rifle steady. Notwithstanding, there were several excellent scores. Noteworthy performances were the centuries registered by Sgt. Downey, of the New Brunswick team, and Lieut. Ritchie of the P. E. I. Their scores at anytime meritorious were doubly so in the face of yesterday's difficult conditions. Only two possibilities at single ranges were made, and both were credited to Island shots, Gnr. McCabe making one at the 200 yds. and Lieut. Ritchie the other at 500 yds. At the end of the shooting at the first range, the Island team led by eight points from New Brunswick and eleven points from Nova Scotia. They were never deprived of the lead. At the 500 yds. range, in fact, they increased it by six points over New Brunswick and seven points over Nova Scotia. At the 600 yards, however, on the results of the first pairs' shooting New Brunswick reduced the Island's lead by seven points, while Nova Scotia also cut five points off. But when the second relays had finished, the Island it was seen had regained the seven points from New Brunswick and had not only also regained from Nova Scotia, the five points lost on the first range but had added another six points to the lead. The match was then generally considered the Island's and these anticipations were realized; though the visiting team in spite of the long lead established on them shot gamely to the end and lost trying and doing their best.

There was a fair number of spectators present, and the keenest interest was manifested in the progress of the match. The best of camaraderie and sportsmanship prevailed among the competing teams, the arrangements, working of the targets, and signalling worked without a hitch and the event was a very successful one.

It was announced by the Range officer at the beginning of the shoot at 600 yards that the Secretaries of the different Associations competing had decided to subscribe from their funds the sum of \$30 to purchase ten badges or other suitable souvenirs for the winning team, their Captain and Coach.

The Range officer, was Capt. Beer, of the P. E. I. Light Horse. The Captain of the Nova Scotia Team was Capt. Dunbar and the Team Coach, Capt. Creelman; the Captain of the New Brunswick team, Col. Wetmore, and its Coach, Sgt. Sullivan; the Captain of the P. E. Island team, Major W. A. Weeks and the Team Coach, Major J. W. Jones.

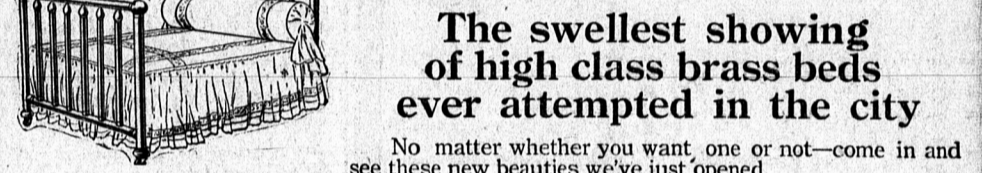
