CANDIDATES WERE CHOSEN

To Contest Charlottetown at the Coming Election

Hon. Geo. E. Hughes and Dr. Warburton for Liberals and Dr. McNeill and P. S. Brown for Conservatives.

The meeting of delegates and others in the Liberal Committee Rooms last night to nominate candidate for the election to the local House was largely attended.

The chair was occupied by Benj. Rogers Esq., President of Liberal Association and E. B. Williams was Secretary.

After the reading out by the Secretary of the names of the delegates chosen the previous evening the nomination was proceeded with.

Hon. George E. Hughes was moved by F. H. Beer and seconded by D. L. Hooper a the property candidate. This choice was unanimously approved of by the meeting and applause.

Dr. Warburton was proposed by A. Down and seconded by W. Warren Royalty. This was also unanimously approved of by the meeting.

Speeches followed by the candidates Messrs Hughes and Warburton and other speakers. After the meeting had concluded canvassing committees were organized and active work begun.

The B. I. S. Hall was well filled with electors to nominate two men in opposition to the Government in the coming election. Dr. MacNeill took the chair.

He said that although Charlottetown was deemed unsafe for the Liberal-Conservatives, and some had thought it better not to put up a fight, it would be the worst thing possible to let the election go by default.

Such a course would weaken the fight in other places and be in the face of strong disapproval of electors in Charlottetown.

P. J. Trainor moved, and R. B. Norton seconded, that P. S. Brown be nominated for Assemblyman. Mr. Brown was unanimously chosen.

He said that there was no better time to win. It would be an easier task to carry the property vote. He was not afraid to try the franchise.

To nominate a property candidate Messrs McCourt, Horne, Johnston and Paton were committed. Their choice was Dr. MacNeill, the meeting making it unanimous. The doctor said little could be done without the hearty support of the electors.

There was every reason why the Liberal-Conservatives should now be supported. He believed the Government would be beaten; and there was nothing unreasonable in so believing.

Mr. MacLean, member elect of the Canadian parliament, spoke shortly. He thought the outlook throughout the Island was bright.

FIRE LAST NIGHT CAUSES DAMAGE

To the Watchman Pub. Co and Others

It Originated from Defective Electric Wiring—Loss in Some Cases Was Not Covered by Insurance.

The firemen were called out at 11 o'clock last night for a blaze in the brick building on the corner of Queen and Dorchester, occupied by the Watchman Pub. Co.

The fire had originated from the electric wiring leading to the barber shop and when the brigade arrived smoke was issuing from the windows and roof.

The alarm had been given by W. P. Dillon who had gone into the shop shortly before eleven and detected the smoke.

The fire was located on the second floor and considerable water was needed before it was extinguished as the floor, and wall had to be considerably cut.

MORE FIGHTING ABOUT MUKDEN

Heavy Artillery Firing Followed by Attacks on Japanese Trenches—Russians Gain Ground Near Lone Tree Hill—Soldiers Repair Winter Quarters—Latest from Port Arthur Siege.

HEAVY ARTILLERY FIGHT. MUKDEN, Nov. 11.—(Special)—There was heavy exchange of artillery fire on the Russian right centre yesterday.

RUSSIANS GAIN GROUND. The Russian batteries shelled the Japanese trenches and the Japs responded.

During the night the Russians dislodged the Japanese infantry from the trenches in front of Lone Tree Hill.

The magazine of the old battery on Sungeow Mountain was exploded by our shells.

JAPS FALLING BACK. MUKDEN, Nov. 12.—(Special)—As a result of the bombardment by the Russians the Japs have retired from their advanced trenches and it is believed that they are ready to attack they are falling back to the hills.

NO GENERAL INCREASE FOR OTHER CLASSES. SCHOOL HOUSE BURNED. SALT BURY, N. B., Nov. 11.—(Special)—The public school house here was destroyed by fire early this morning with its contents. Loss nearly \$4,000.

FATAL ACCIDENT AT FREDERICTON. Louis, the young son of James F. Stevenson aged 14 years, of Fredericton, met with an accident Thursday afternoon which has had a fatal result.

One of the horses on the horse power where he was assisting in threshing, got loose, and when the young lad was in the act of tying him his foot caught in the foot of the horsepower and his leg was dragged into the knee between the fly-wheel spindle and the floor, a very narrow space.

The machinery was stopped as quickly as possible and the boy was extricated. Drs. Simpson, Honeywell and McKenzie who were quickly summoned found it necessary to amputate the injured limb. After the operation the boy was resting easy at first but passed away at six o'clock yesterday morning.

PRELIMINARY MURDER TRIAL. The preliminary hearing of Michael Power charged with the murder of Harry Warren was begun at the Police Court Room yesterday before Stipendiary McDonald. There was no great interest taken in the case and the court was only partially filled.

Five witnesses were examined viz. Cecelia Kelly, James Robinson, Arthur Douse, Albert Heron and Frank Heron whose evidence was previously published in the Guardian, but nothing beyond the evidence at the inquest was brought out. The crown was represented by F. L. Haszard K. C. and the prisoner had no counsel. The case was adjourned till today for further hearing. It is probable that the case will be concluded today.

MANY PEOPLE EXTEND WELCOME

To Bishop Worrell on Arrival in Halifax

From 1,500 to 2,000 Were Present and a Thoroughly Enjoyable Evening—Presented With Addresses.

(Halifax Herald.) From fifteen hundred to two thousand people were present at the reception tendered to His Lordship Bishop Worrell, in St. Paul's parish hall last night.

The building was tastefully decorated with flowers, while the British ensign was festooned in graceful folds around the walls and over the gallery. All the evening the crowds were coming and going, some

only staying a short time and others remaining all through. The pleasure of meeting His Lordship and his charming family, selections of music, merry conversation and choice refreshments all helped to pass an evening long to be remembered. The bishop was assisted in the reception by Mrs. Worrell and their two daughters, and also by the wives of the Halifax rectors. Mrs. Crawford directed the work of the ladies' committee, and that in itself is sufficient guarantee that everything passed off smoothly and without a hitch to mar the pleasure of the occasion. The reception not only gave His Lordship an opportunity of meeting such large number of those, both of the laity and the clergy, who will be co-workers with him in this diocese, but it also gave the members of the various churches an opportunity to come together to talk over church matters, and to allow the rectors and curates to mingle with them, in a way, which perhaps no other gathering could have done. In spite of the arduous work of the day, commencing with the enthronement, an account of which will be found on His Lordship showed no sign of fatigue and seemed to stand the strain remarkably well.

During the evening two addresses were presented to the bishop, one from the executive committee of the synod, representing the diocese of Nova Scotia, and one from the members of the chapter. The venerable dean of Nova Scotia, Rev. Edwin Gilpin, presented them, and Archdeacon Kaulbach presented the Episcopal ring.

The Court then adjourned till Monday morning at eleven o'clock.

WHILE INSANE KILLS HER CHILD

Drowning the Infant in Water of a Well

First Thought of Suicide but icy Water in Part Restored Her Senses—Said Nothing of Tragedy.

DROWNED INFANT IN A WELL. HALIFAX, Nov. 11.—(Special)—Mrs. Thos. Corball, middle aged woman, while temporarily insane drowned her infant tonight in a well.

FIRST CONTEMPLATED SUICIDE. She had crawled down evidently with suicidal intentions, but the cold water partially restored her senses and she decided to save herself and let the child go.

SHE SAID NOTHING OF TRAGEDY. She went to the well for her web clothing, but said nothing of the tragedy. The child was missed and the search party found the body where the mother had placed it in the water.
