THE Sackville Post says:—At the quarterly meeting of the Charlottetown Board of Trade last week strong resolutions were passed condemning the new Capes Ferry bill in the commons. The objections urged were that in the present state of the harbors it was utterly impracticable and will lessen public interest in regular communication. The route is not calculated to improve the commercial interests of the province and will weaken recognized claims for the continuous winter steam communication. The resolution was telegraphed to the minister of public works, Ottawa. This is exactly in line with what the Charlottetown people have done in the past. The Island people for six or eight months of the year grumble and growl and pass resolutions condemning the mail and passenger service between the Island and main land. For thirty years or more they have kept this up and what has been the result? Have they accomplished anything? Was it the mail and passenger service better last season than it was twenty-five years ago? Not at all. The Island people have never yet agreed among themselves. Charlottetown wants everything in right, and unless she gets it there is bound to be trouble. It does not matter how well the remainder of the Island may be served, if the Charlottetown is not considered first last and all the time, then look out for squalls. The Capes ferry if run in connection with the N.B. & P.E.I. railway would provide the Island with the best possible mail and passenger service that it can ever hope to secure. The Cape route is the shortest and best route to the Island; it is the natural route and it is the one that will finally be selected, the Charlottetown Board of Trade to the contrary notwithstanding.
