SEVERE ELECTRICAL STORM AT MONTREAL. MONTREAL, June 19—Electrical storms of unusual severity, accompanied by hurricane gusts of wind and floods of rain visited Montreal today, doing considerable damage. The residence of John Mack, a stone building at Back River and a wooden structure in Notre Dame De Grace were struck by lightning and burned. Wires were blown down in various parts of the city, and at the height of the storm the Montreal Light, Heat and Power Company closed their plant for some fifteen minutes. The wind was so strong that building operations were stopped. Many shade trees were damaged, while coronation decorations suffered severely. No hospital cases have resulted however.

The City Hall was receiving its decorations for the Coronation yesterday and this work on the Post Office is about finished.

The death occurred at Dartmouth yesterday of Anna, relict of Hon. Edward Rielly, of Charlottetown, Mrs. Rielly was a sister of Maurice Noonan, the veteran life saver of Sable Island, who is now in Dartmouth. She leaves a daughter, Mrs. William T. Beazley, at whose residence she passed away, and four grandchildren, all of whom will have the sincere sympathy of their many friends. Mrs. Rielly's husband was a prominent figure in the political life of Prince Edward Island over thirty-five years ago and represented the district of St. Peters in the local legislature, being elected to oppose confederation. He was editor and proprietor of the Charlottetown Herald, a weekly journal which is still published. Rielly was stricken with paralysis several weeks ago and her demise was not unexpected. She was a lady of many excellent parts and will be greatly missed by a host of friends—Halifax Herald.
