PROVINCIAL CONVENTION (Continued from Page 1) At the afternoon session a resolution regarding the packing house strike in Charlottetown was passed. It criticized the Government for acting as a strikebreaker and union buster instead of taking action to improve the conditions of farmers and workers alike, also for leaving workers who had the courage to act as free citizens of Canada to walk the streets and thus allowing gross inefficiency in the Canada Packers plant in Charlottetown.

The resolution supported "unity between labor and farmer," and "laws guaranteeing security and the right to organize to all working citizens, farmers, workers and fishermen alike."

Evening Meeting David Lewis, national secretary of the C.C.F., and Fred Young, Maritime director of the same party, were the speakers at a C.C.F. meeting held last night in Kensington.

The meeting was presided over by Mr. George Wotton, provincial president of the party.

Mr. Young told the audience that the C.C.F. principles were identical the same as those held and practiced by the political parties which were in power in Australia, New Zealand, and in the Scandinavian countries, and that the standard of living in those socialist countries was the highest in the world.

He cited the Farm Security Act of Saskatchewan as being the greatest piece of farm legislation ever enacted by a Canadian province and stated it gave the Saskatchewan farmer economic protection not enjoyed by the farmer of any other province. An annual contribution of \$5.00, he said, gave an individual in Saskatchewan complete medical attention for whatever period necessary and added that a contribution of \$30 gave the same protection to any Saskatchewan family of six or more members.

Mr. Lewis said if Premier Jones' statement that cheap labour was necessary in the Province to encourage outside industries to come to the Island were true, then the Province should have been industrialized long ago. The theory did not hold water, Mr. Lewis said, for wages were always higher where industry was concentrated since wages must be high in order for the consumer to buy industry's goods.

It was a strange thing, Mr. Lewis said, that the people who condemn the workers when they strike for a living wage did not condemn the manufacturers of Canada who went on strike at the beginning of the last war and refused to make armaments until they were assured of big profits.
